1. To receive, consider and adopt:

NOTES:**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT:**

1. The relative explanatory statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act"), setting out material facts concerning the business under Item No. 3 set out above and details under 36(3) of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations") and Paragraph 1.2.5 of the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings, in respect of the Director seeking re-appointment at the Annual General Meeting ("AGM" / "Meeting") are annexed hereto.

VIRTUAL MEETING:

2. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") has, vide its General 20/2020 dated 5th May, 2020 read with the subsequent circulars issued from time to time, the latest one being General Circular No. 03/2025 dated 22nd September, 2025 (MCA Circulars), permitted convening the AGM through Video Conferencing ("VC") or Other Audio Visual Means ("OAVM"), without physical presence of the members at a common venue. In accordance with the MCA Circulars and applicable provisions of the Act read with Rules made thereunder and the Listing Regulations, the 43rd AGM of the Company is being held through VC / OAVM. The deemed venue for the AGM shall be the Registered Office of the Company at 209-210, Arcadia Building, 2nd Floor, 195 Nariman Point, Mumbai - 400021.
3. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, a Member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a Member of the Company. Since 43rd AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA Circulars through VC / OAVM, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members will not be available for the 43rd AGM and hence the Proxy Form, Attendance Slip and Route Map are not annexed to this Notice.
4. As per the provisions under the MCA Circulars, Members attending the 43rd AGM through VC shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.

AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE:

5. Institutional / Corporate Members are entitled to appoint authorized representatives to attend, participate at the AGM through VC / OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting. Institutional / Corporate Members are requested to send a scanned copy (PDF / JPEG format) of the Board Resolution authorizing its representatives to attend and vote at the AGM, pursuant to Section 113 of the Act, to the Scrutinizer at gandhiofficeinfo@gmail.com and to evoting@nsdl.com.

DISPATCH OF ANNUAL REPORT:

6. In accordance with the circulars issued by MCA and SEBI, the Notice of the 43rd AGM along with the Annual Report for the financial year 2025-2026 is being sent by electronic mode to Members whose e-mail ids are registered with the Company / Registrar & Share Transfer Agent (RTA) or the Depository Participants (DPs).
7. In terms of Section 136 of the Act read with the rules made thereunder, Regulation 36 of the Listing Regulations and in terms of circulars issued by MCA and SEBI, the notice of 43rd AGM along with the annual report, including financial statements, boards' report, etc. are being sent only through electronic mode to those Members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/ Depositories unless the Members have requested for a physical copy of the same. Members may note that this Notice and Annual Report 2025-2026 will also be available on the Company's website www.winrocommercial.com and website of BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com and on the website of NSDL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility) i.e. www.evoting.nsdl.com.
8. In compliance with Regulation 36 of the Listing Regulations, the Company is also sending a written communication to Members, who have not yet registered their email addresses, providing the web-link of the exact path, where complete details of Annual Report for financial year 2025-2026 will be available.

PROCESS FOR OBTAINING PHYSICAL COPY OF ANNUAL REPORT:

9. The Company shall send a physical copy of the Annual Report to those Members who request for the same at winro.investor@gcvl.in mentioning their Folio No./ DP id and Client id.

PROCEDURE TO JOIN THE AGM ON NATIONAL SECURITIES DEPOSITORY LIMITED (NSDL) E-VOTING SYSTEM:

10. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Act read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended), Regulation 44 of Listing Regulations (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, the members are provided with the facility to cast their vote electronically, through the e-voting services provided by NSDL, on all the resolutions set forth in this Notice. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with NSDL for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized agency. The instructions for participation by Members are given in the subsequent paragraphs. Participation at the AGM through VC shall be allowed on a first-come-first-served basis.
11. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available for 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
12. The Company has provided the facility to Members to exercise their right to vote by electronic means both through remote e-voting and e-voting during the AGM. The process of remote e-voting with necessary User ID and Password is given in the subsequent paragraphs. Such remote e-voting facility is in addition to voting that will take place at the 43rd AGM being held through VC.
13. Members joining the meeting through VC, who have not already cast their vote by means of remote e-voting, shall be able to exercise their right to vote through e-voting at the AGM. The Members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting prior to the AGM may also join the AGM through VC but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.
14. Members who have not registered their e-mail address are requested to register the same in respect of shares held in electronic form with the Depository through their Depository Participant(s) and in respect of shares held in physical form by writing to the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agent, MUFG Intime India Private Limited at C-101, 1st Floor, 247 Park, Lal Bahadur Shastri Marg, Vikhroli West, Mumbai- 400083 or may write to the Company at winro.investor@gcvl.in.
15. In case of joint holders attending the AGM, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote.
16. All documents referred to in the accompanying Notice and the Explanatory Statement shall be available for inspection electronically. Members seeking to inspect such documents can send an email to winro.investor@gcvl.in.

17. Further, as required under Regulation 36(3) of the Listing Regulations and the provisions of the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings, details of the directors, who are being appointed/re-appointed are annexed hereto. The Company has received the requisite consents/declarations for the appointment/re-appointment under the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made thereunder.

SEBI MANDATE ON KYC COMPLIANCE:

18. SEBI vide its Master circular no. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/ MIRSD-PoD/P/CIR/2025/91 dated 23rd June, 2025, has mandated that any service request from members holding securities in physical mode shall be entertained only upon registration of the PAN and KYC details. Members are requested to submit Form ISR-1 duly filled and signed along with self-attested copy of the PAN card and such other documents as prescribed in the form, to register or update:

- PAN and KYC details
- E-mail address to receive communication through electronic means.

Members are also requested to update their nomination by submitting Form SH-13 or Form ISR-3 for opting out of nomination.

Communication in this regard has been sent to all physical holders whose folios are not KYC compliant at the latest available address/email-id. Members are once again requested to update their KYC details by submitting the Investor Service Request (ISR) Forms, viz. ISR-1, ISR-2, ISR-3/SH-13, as applicable, duly complete and signed by the registered holder(s) to the Company's RTA.

Further, the aforesaid SEBI Master Circular has simplified the procedure and standardized the format of documents for transmission of securities. Accordingly, Members are requested to submit their service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR-4 and ISR-5 (in case of transmission). As mandated by SEBI, all such service requests will be processed by the Company/RTA in dematerialized mode only.

26. In compliance with provisions of Section 108 of the Act read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 as amended by the Companies (Management and Administration) Amendment Rules, 2015 and Regulation 44 of the Listing Regulations, the Company is pleased to provide members facility to exercise their right to

vote on resolutions proposed to be considered at the AGM by electronic means. The facility of casting the votes by the members using an electronic voting system from a place other than venue of the AGM ("remote e-voting") will be provided by NSDL.

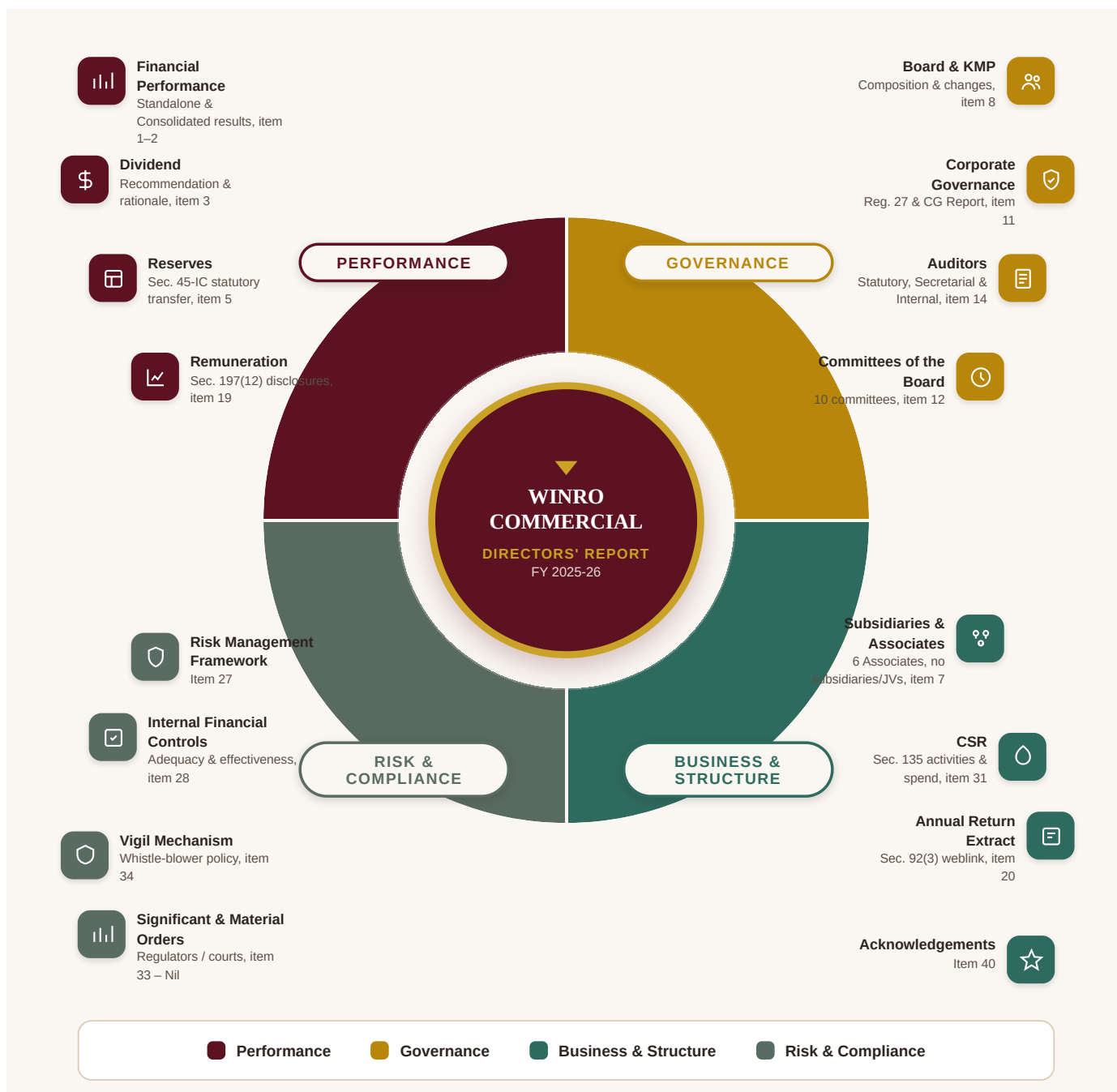

The Company is a NBFC registered with the Reserve Bank of India under the category of Investment and Credit Company (NBFC-ICC). The Company is engaged in the business of investment and trading in shares and securities and lending activities.

The Company continued to carry on its business activities during the financial year ended 31st March, 2026, in accordance with its objects and applicable regulatory framework. During the year under review, the Company remained focused on strengthening its core business operations, maintaining prudent financial and operational practices and ensuring compliance with the applicable statutory and regulatory requirements.

The management continued to monitor the prevailing business and economic environment and took appropriate measures to support sustainable growth and operational efficiency. The Company remains committed to maintaining sound corporate governance practices, prudent risk management and responsible business conduct while pursuing its business objectives.

The Audited Financial Statements of your Company as on 31st March, 2026, are prepared in accordance with the relevant applicable Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") and Regulation 33 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations") and as per the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read together with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time, other relevant provisions of the Act on an accrual basis.

- **Revenues – Standalone:**

The standalone revenue from operations and other income of the Company stood at Rs. 13,955.59 Lakhs for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 as against Rs. 44,849.89 Lakhs in the previous financial year, this includes a realised gain on financial instruments of Rs. 4,973.91 Lakhs and an unrealised gain of Rs. 5,709.01 Lakhs. After providing for Depreciation the Company has earned a profit before tax of Rs. 12,544.73 Lakhs as against Rs. 42,605.35 Lakhs. After making provision for tax for the year, the profit for the year amounted to Rs. 10,081.16 Lakhs as against Rs. 34,016.16 Lakhs.

The Company's other comprehensive income (net of tax) for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 was Rs. 3,004.81 Lakhs compared to Rs. 28,736.66 Lakhs in previous year, this includes a realised gain on financial instruments of Rs. 3,669.42 Lakhs and an unrealised loss of Rs. 144.91 Lakhs. The Company's total comprehensive income for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 was Rs. 13,085.97 Lakhs as against Rs. 62,752.82 Lakhs in the previous financial year.

- **Revenues – Consolidated:**

The Company has consolidated the financial statement of its associate Companies in accordance with Ind AS 28 "Accounting for - Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures" by using "Equity Method" of consolidation.

The share in profit/(loss) of associates for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 was Rs. 9,285.79 Lakhs compared to profit of Rs. 6,180.11 Lakhs in the previous financial year. The share in other comprehensive income of associates for the financial year 2025-2026 was Rs. 1,631.72 Lakhs compared to Rs. 8,175.43 Lakhs in the previous financial year.

After considering Company's share of comprehensive income, Company's Other Comprehensive Income for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 was profit of Rs. 2,891.49 Lakhs (This includes a realised gain on financial instruments of Rs. 3,669.42 Lakhs and an unrealised loss of Rs. 2,181.13 Lakhs) as against Company's other comprehensive income for the financial year ended 31st March, 2025 was profit of Rs. 28,862.85 Lakhs. Company's Total Comprehensive Income for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 was profit of Rs. 22,258.43 as against Company's total comprehensive income for the financial year ended 31st March, 2025 was profit of Rs. 69,059.12 Lakhs.

3. DIVIDEND:

The Company is a Non-Banking Financial Company (NBFC) mainly engaged in Investment Activities considering the capital intensive business to support its future growth, your Directors do not recommend any dividend for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 with a view to conserve the resources for future.

4. TRANSFER OF UNCLAIMED DIVIDEND TO INVESTOR EDUCATION AND PROTECTION FUND:

The provisions of Section 125(2) of the Act do not apply as there was no dividend declared and paid last year.

There has been no change in nature of the business of the Company during the financial year under review.

6A. NOTE ON DISCONTINUANCE OF WINDMILL POWER GENERATION ACTIVITY:

The Company had, in addition to its core business of investment and trading in shares and securities and lending activities, been engaged in the generation of electricity through a windmill as a renewable energy. During the year under review,

the Company discontinued this windmill-based power generation activity, and the Board approved the disposal of the windmill. Accordingly, the windmill and the underlying land have been reclassified from Property, Plant and Equipment to Assets Held for Sale, in accordance with Ind AS 105, "Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations". This reclassification has been given effect to in the Standalone and Consolidated Financial Statements for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026.

26. NUMBER OF MEETINGS OF THE BOARD, ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING AND EXTRA ORDINARY GENERAL MEETINGS:

During the year, Four (4) meetings of the Board of Directors were held. The maximum time gap between any two Meetings was not more than one hundred and twenty days. These Meetings were well attended.

The 42nd Annual General Meeting of the Company was held on 25th September, 2025. However, During the year under review, no Extraordinary General Meeting was held.

Detailed information on the Meetings of the Board, its Committees, the Annual General Meeting/ Extra Ordinary General Meeting & Postal Ballots is included in the Report on Corporate Governance, which forms part of this Annual Report.

27. RISK MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK:

Risk Management is an integral part to the Company's strategy for achieving the long-term goals. The risk is managed through risk management framework approved by the Board of Directors, encompassing independent identification, measurement and management of risk across associated with the primary business of the Company. The Company is exposed to a variety of risks including strategic risk, reputational risk, credit risk, market risk, liquidity risk, operational risk, regulatory & compliance risk, financial risk, competition risk, IT related risk, business continuity risk and cyber risks.

To effectively address these challenges, the Company has established a comprehensive risk management policy to identify, evaluate, mitigate and manage the risks that are encountered during the conduct of business activities, which may pose significant loss or threat to the Company.

The Risk Management Committee of the Board is entrusted with the responsibility of overseeing the risk management process in the Company. In addition to reviewing cyber security functions and assessing various risks, the Committee ensures that identified risks are aligned with the organization's strategy and that the appropriate mitigation strategies are in place. The Audit Committee provides an additional oversight in the area of financial risks and internal controls.

28. INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROL SYSTEM & ITS ADEQUACY:

- The Company has in place adequate Internal Financial Controls with reference to financial statements. The Audit Committee actively reviews the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control systems and is also apprised of the internal audit findings and corrective actions.
- The internal financial control system of the Company is supplemented with internal audits, regular reviews by the management and checks by external auditors. It provides reasonable assurance in respect of financial and operational information, compliance with applicable statutes safeguarding the assets of the Company, prevention and detection of frauds, accuracy and completeness of accounting records and also ensuring compliance with the Company's policies.
- The Statutory Auditors and the Internal Auditors of the Company also provide confirmation that the internal financial controls framework is operating effectively. During the year, no material or serious observations have been highlighted for inefficiency or inadequacy of such controls.

Report of the Statutory Auditors on the Internal Financial Controls with reference to the financial statements as required under clause (i) of Sub-section 3 of Section 143 of the Act forms part of this Annual Report as Annexure-A to the Statutory Auditors Report.

29. INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY GOVERNANCE & CYBER SECURITY:

The Company recognizes the importance of robust Information Technology (IT) governance and cyber security in ensuring the confidentiality, integrity, availability and resilience of its information systems and digital operations. The Company has established appropriate IT governance frameworks, policies, processes and controls aligned with applicable regulatory requirements and industry practices.

The Company continues to strengthen its IT infrastructure and information security framework to address evolving technology and cyber security risks. Appropriate controls are implemented for access management, data protection, network security, system monitoring, vulnerability management, incident response, backup and recovery, and business continuity.

The Company maintains mechanisms for timely identification, reporting, escalation and management of information security incidents. Business continuity and disaster recovery arrangements are periodically reviewed and tested to support the resilience and continuity of critical operations.

In view of the increased cyberattack scenarios, the cyber security maturity is reviewed periodically and the processes, technology controls are being enhanced in-line with the threat scenarios. Company's technology environment is enabled with real time security monitoring with requisite controls at various layers starting from end user machines to network, application and the data. During the financial year under review, no such incidence was reported.

30. INSURANCE:

The Company has adequately insured all its assets and properties.

31. CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY:

The Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) Committee is established by the Board in accordance with Section 135 of the Act.

As per the provisions of Section 135 of the Act, the Company's CSR liability for Financial Year 2025-2026 was Rs. 5,54,40,189/-. However, in the previous year, the Company had spent an excess amount of Rs. 50,38,844/-. After setting off the said excess expenditure of the previous year, the net amount required to be spent during financial year 2025-2026 was Rs. 5,04,01,345/-.

Against this requirement, the Company spent Rs. 5,04,10,000/- towards CSR in financial year 2025-2026. Consequently, an excess of Rs. 8,655/- has been carried forward to the next year.

The Annual report on the CSR Activities of the Company during the year is enclosed as "**Annexure 2**" and forms part of this report in the format prescribed in the Companies (Corporate Social Responsibility Policy) Rules, 2014.

5. Formulation of an annual action plan.

The Chief Financial Officer has certified that the funds disbursed on the basis of the annual action plan for the financial year 2025-2026 have been utilised for the purpose and in the manner as approved by the Board.

32. BOARD EVALUATION & MEETING OF INDEPENDENT DIRECTORS:

Pursuant to the provisions of the Act and Regulation 17 of the Listing Regulations, the Board carried out the annual evaluation of its own as well as performance of that of its committees. The Board also carried out performance evaluation of all the individual directors. Additionally, the Nomination and Remuneration Committee of the Board also carried out the evaluation of the performance of the individual directors. The performance evaluation was carried out by the way of obtaining feedback from the directors through a structured questionnaire prepared in accordance with the Board Evaluation Policy.

The evaluation process focused on various aspects of the Board and Committees' functioning including their composition, experience, competencies, performance of specific duties, obligations, monitoring of corporate governance practices,

participation in the long-term strategic planning, attendance and contribution of individual directors and exercise of independent judgement, including but not limited to, active participation at the Board and Committee meetings.

The independent directors of the Company met separately at their meeting held on 20th March, 2026, without the attendance of non-independent directors and members of the management and reviewed the performance of non-independent directors, chairman and various committees of the Board and assessed the quality, quantity and timeliness of the flow of information between the Management and the Board, while evaluating progress on the recommendations made during the previous year.

The independent directors expressed their satisfaction regarding the overall functioning of the Board and its Committees for the financial year 2025-2026. Based on the evaluation report, the Board at their meeting held on 13th August, 2026, determined that the appointment of all independent directors may continue.

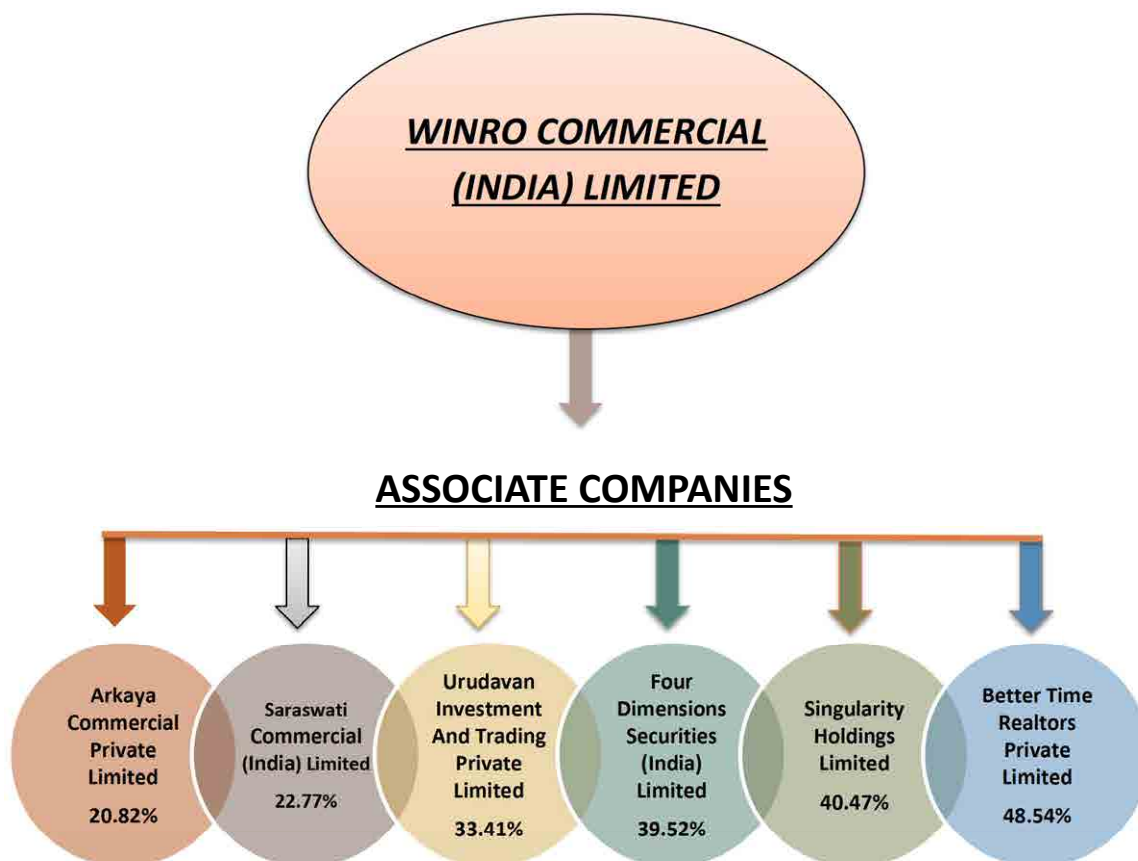

Winro Commercial (India) Limited ("the Company") is an Investment and Credit Company (ICC), primarily engaged in the business of investment and trading in shares and securities. The Company is registered as a non-deposit taking Non-Banking Financial Company (NBFC) pursuant to the Certificate of Registration dated 16th July 2007 issued by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) under Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934. Pursuant to the RBI Directions notified by the RBI, the asset size of the Company on a standalone basis exceeds Rs. 1,000 crores; hence, the Company falls under the category of Middle Layer NBFC (NBFC-ML).

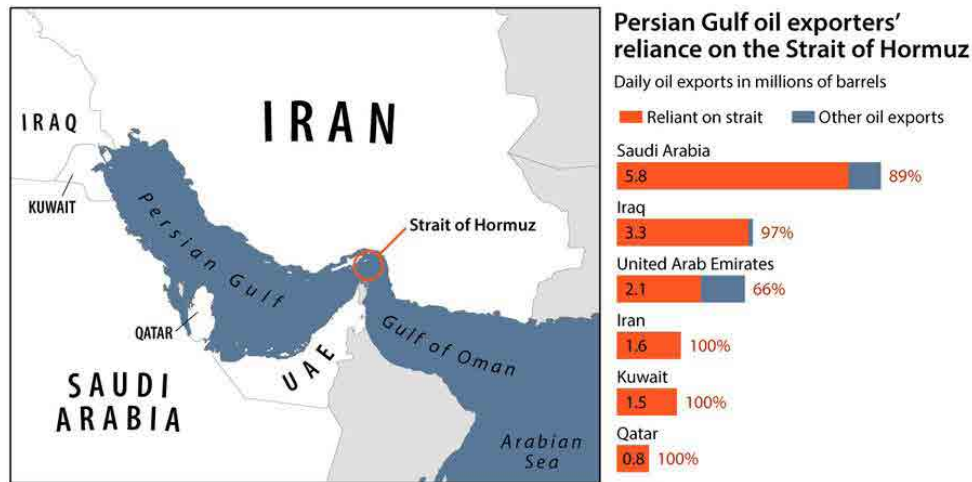

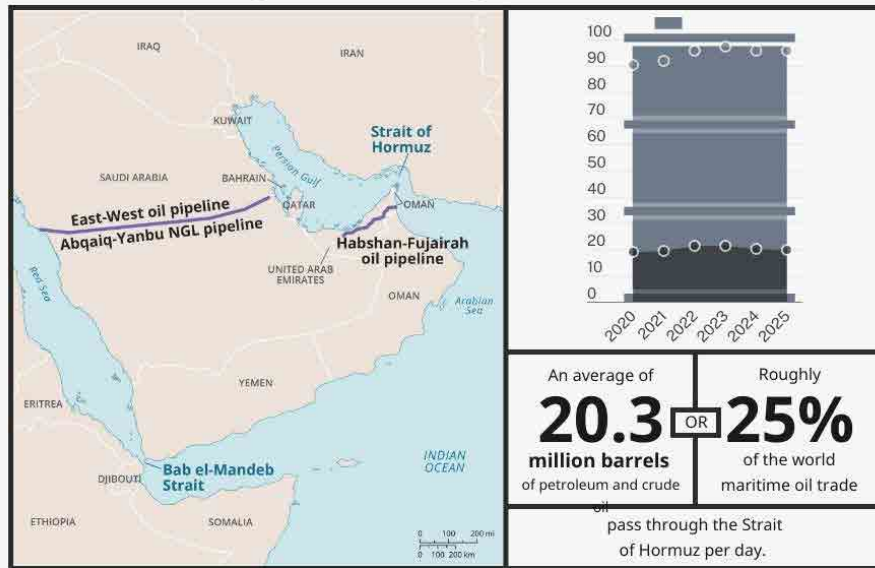
(a) ECONOMIC REVIEW:

Global Economy:

The global outlook has suddenly become more uncertain following the outbreak of war in the Middle East on **February 28, 2026**. The closure of the Strait of Hormuz and serious damage to key production facilities in a region that is central to global hydrocarbon supply could lead to an unprecedented energy crisis.

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The global economy faced a challenging environment due to geopolitical developments, trade fluctuations, and inflationary pressures. Despite these challenges, the global economy remained resilient. However, the ongoing conflict in the Middle East has created new uncertainty by increasing commodity prices, disrupting supply chains, and causing greater volatility in financial markets. Economic growth remained uneven across major economies, with China and the United States continuing to face structural challenges.

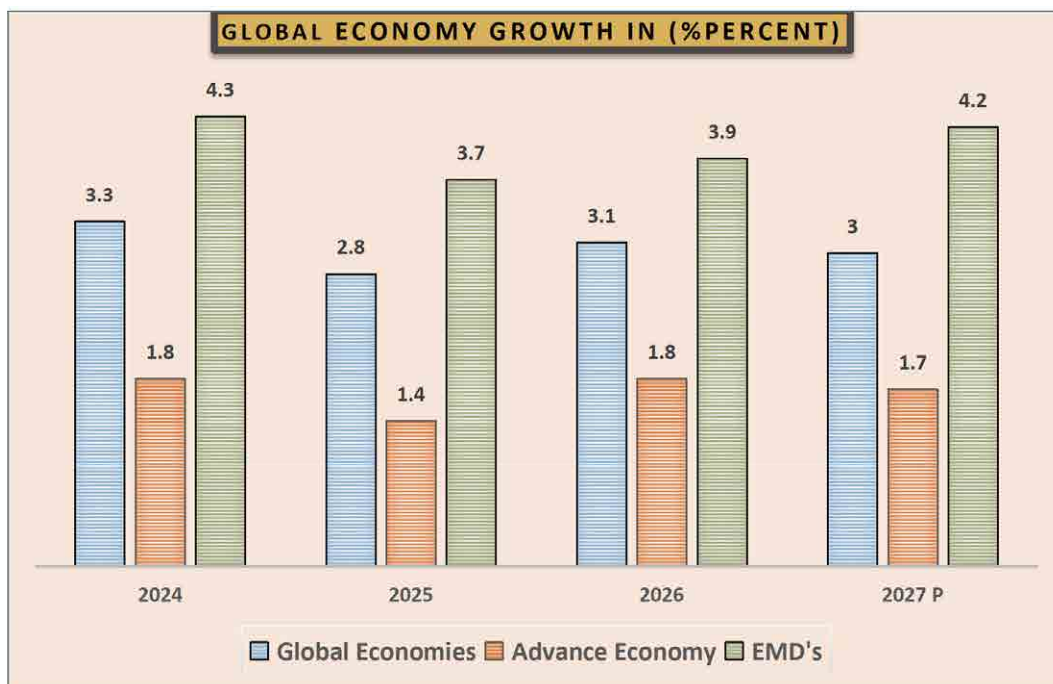
Disruptions to critical energy infrastructure and a near halt in shipments through the Strait of Hormuz constrained the global flow of crude oil, petroleum products, and liquefied natural gas. This triggered sharp increases in energy prices, accompanied by heightened volatility driven by uncertainty over the duration and impact of the conflict, while also posing broader risks to global supply chains.

Supportive fiscal policies and the growing use of artificial intelligence (AI) are expected to improve long-term productivity and support economic growth, if supported by effective and balanced policies. Global trade remained weak because of geopolitical tensions and changes in global supply chains. Financial conditions remained tight but stable, with cautious lending, high bond yields, and improving equity markets influencing investment and risk management across sectors.

The **Global GDP** is projected to expand by 3.1% in 2026 and 3.2% in 2027 (IMF World Economic Outlook, April 26), supported by momentum in the high-tech sector despite broader drag from tariffs and uncertainty.

In advanced economies, growth is forecast at 1.8% in 2026 and 1.7% in 2027, with the Middle East conflict weighing on activity through elevated energy prices and weaker trade. The impact, however, remains relatively contained due to positive terms-of-trade benefits for energy exporters and fiscal support in key economies.

Emerging markets and developing economies are projected to grow by 3.9% in 2026 and 4.2% in 2027, with the Middle East conflict exerting a larger impact because of greater exposure to energy imports, remittances, and financial flows.

Indian Economy:

India continued to be one of the fastest-growing major economies, supported by strong domestic demand, structural reforms, and government policies. In recent years, India became the world's **FIFTH - LARGEST** economy after overtaking the UK. However, in FY 2025, global uncertainty, rising geopolitical tensions, and inflation slowed the country's economic growth.

The Government of India continues to advance its growth agenda through the Union Budget 2026-27, guided by three core kartavyas. The first focuses on accelerating and sustaining economic growth by enhancing productivity, strengthening competitiveness, and building resilience amid global uncertainties. The second aims to fulfil the aspirations of citizens by

empowering them and building their capabilities as active partners in the nation's progress. The third, aligned with the vision of **SABKA SAATH, SABKA VIKAS**, seeks to ensure inclusive access to opportunities, resources, and essential services across all segments of society.

From a sectoral perspective, services continued to be the primary growth driver, while manufacturing showed gradual improvement supported by Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes and supply chain diversification. Investment activity remained strong, with gross fixed capital formation contributing significantly to GDP growth. Fiscal consolidation also progressed steadily, with the fiscal deficit budgeted 4.4% of GDP in FY26, reflecting a balance between growth support and fiscal prudence. FY26 was characterised by resilient growth, macroeconomic stability, controlled inflation, and strong policy support, positioning India as a key driver of global economic expansion despite external headwinds.

India is evolving rapidly towards an AI-enabled economy, with government initiatives focused on innovation, digital infrastructure, and workforce skilling to support widespread adoption across sectors. AI is expected to enhance productivity, improve service delivery, and foster innovation-led entrepreneurship. Over the medium term, AI integration is likely to act as a structural growth catalyst, strengthening competitiveness and supporting sustained economic expansion.

According to projections from the IMF, India is expected to become the world's third-largest economy by 2030, underscoring its sustained growth momentum and increasingly prominent role in the Global economic landscape.



Real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Gross Value Added (GVA) at constant prices

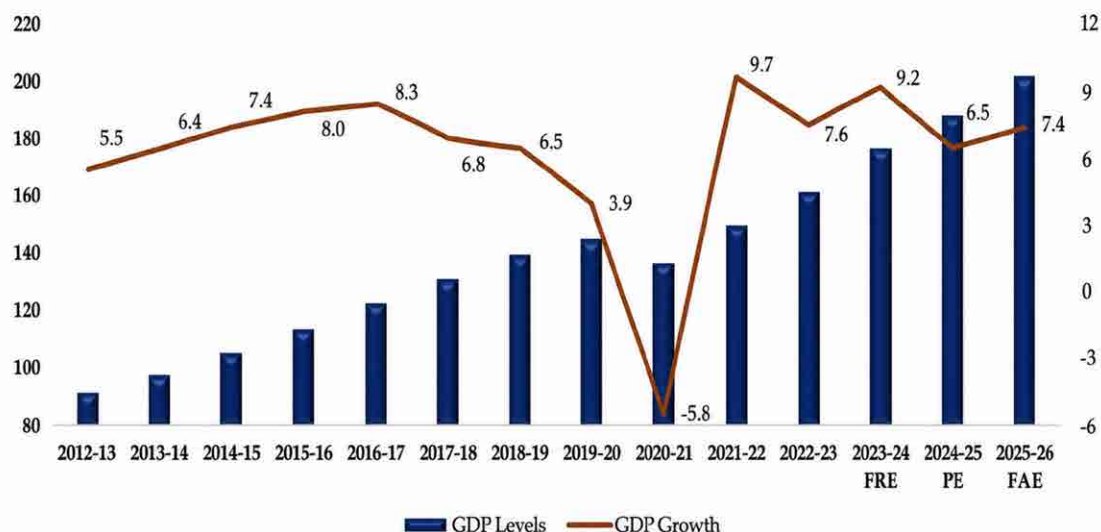

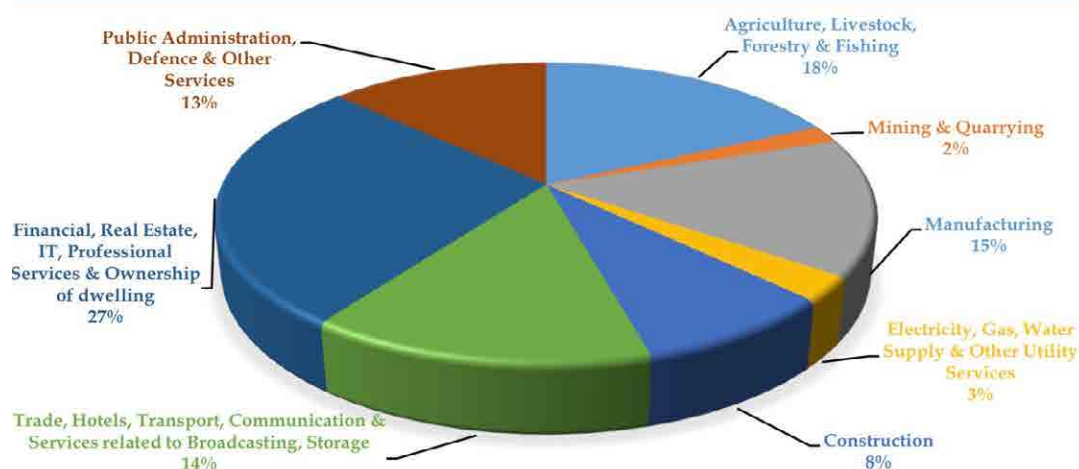
Annual GVA Estimates (in Rs. Lakh Crore) and Growth Rates (%) at Constant Prices

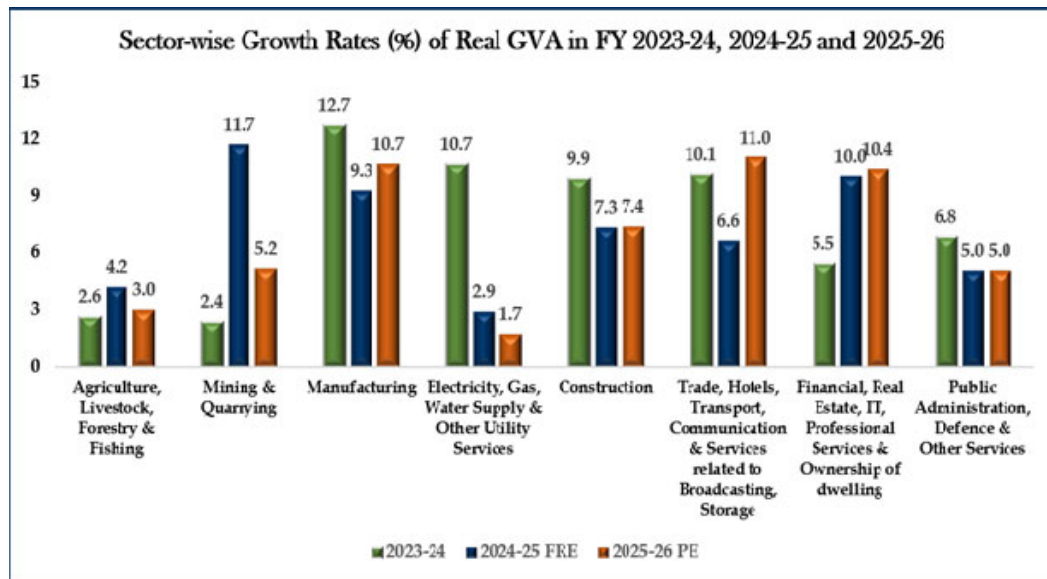


Annual GDP Estimates (in Rs. Lakh Crore) and Growth Rates (%) at Constant Prices



SECTORAL COMPOSITION AND GROWTH RATES OF ANNUAL GVA

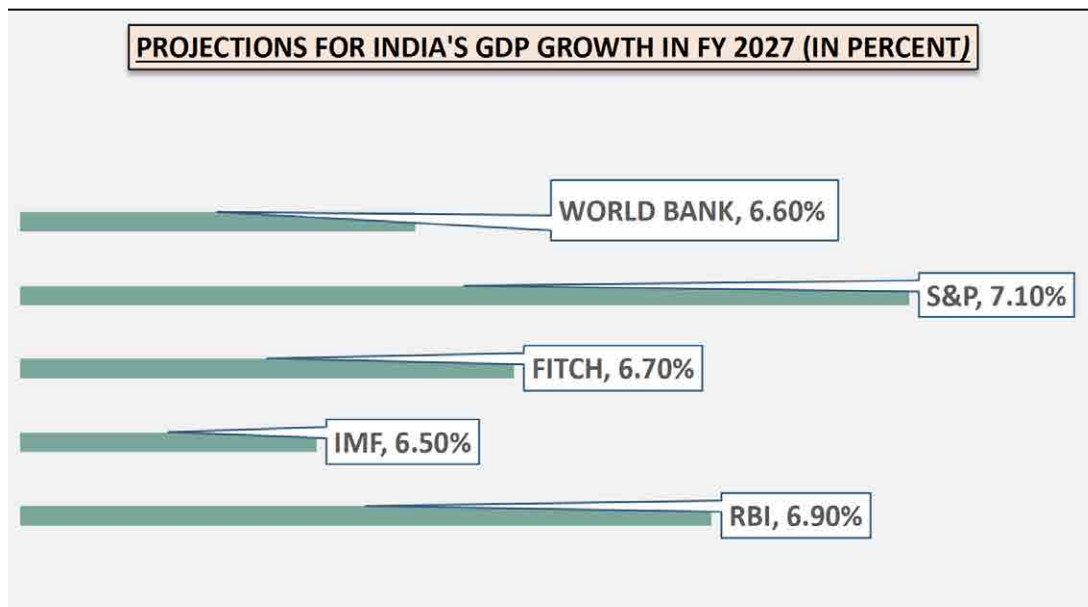




(b) OUTLOOK:

Amid volatile global markets, the Indian economy is expected to remain resilient through 2026-27, supported by strong domestic demand, sustained government-led capital expenditure, and steady services sector momentum. The IMF continues to view India as the fastest-growing major economy in 2026, driven by domestic demand and investment activity. Structural drivers, including manufacturing expansion, digitalisation, and increasing financialisation, are likely to support GDP growth in the 6-8% range over the medium term.

Chart depicts the projections for India's GDP Growth by various institutions in FY 2027.



(c) INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS:

India's progress has been recognised by global credit rating agencies. During the year, Standard & Poor's (S&P) upgraded India's sovereign credit rating from BBB- to BBB. Morningstar DBRS also increased India's rating from BBB-low to BBB. Japan's Rating and Investment Information, Inc. (R&I) upgraded India's long-term sovereign rating from BBB to BBB+ and

kept the outlook as Stable. These upgrades show that India is one of the world's largest and fastest-growing economies. They also highlight the country's strong and resilient economic performance.

- **Non-Banking Financial Companies:**

India's credit market has a lot of room to grow. Over the past 10 years, private sector credit as a share of GDP has increased from 37% to 50%. However, this is still lower than in many middle and high-income countries, showing that there is good potential for further growth. To support India's long-term economic growth, credit is expected to grow by 16-17% every year, which is about 1.5 times the growth of the country's nominal GDP.

This growth is closely linked to India's rising consumer demand. With per capita income close to US\$3,000 and the middle class expected to reach about 38% by 2031 and nearly 60% by 2047, consumer spending is likely to increase steadily. Much of this growth will come from Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities. As people's incomes rise, they are spending less on basic needs and more on non-essential goods and services, showing an improvement in their standard of living.

In this environment, Non-Banking Financial Companies (NBFCs) are well placed to meet the growing demand for credit. Bank credit is expected to grow at a slower rate of 12-13%, mainly because deposit growth is slowing. This gives NBFCs an opportunity to meet the increasing demand for loans. According to CRISIL, NBFC credit is already growing at 18-19%. Since NBFCs provide only about one-fourth of total lending, they have strong potential to grow further.

NBFCs have also built a strong position in sectors that are growing quickly and need more financial support. For example, lending to Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) has grown faster than bank lending. In the Micro Loan against Property (Micro-LAP) segment for loans below Rs. 10 lakh, NBFCs have a leading market share. Government reforms, credit guarantee schemes, co-lending partnerships, and digital platforms such as India Stack, GSTIN, and TReDS have made these sectors more organized and less risky. These changes have improved loan assessment, increased access to formal credit, and reduced information gaps in the lending system.

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has consolidated its regulatory instructions into 238 Master Directions covering 11 categories of regulated entities across 30 regulatory areas.

The consolidation includes all instructions issued up to 9 October, 2025. As part of this exercise, around 9,000 existing circulars, including earlier Master Circulars and Master Directions (including Scale based regulation), have been repealed. The objective is to:

- Simplify regulatory Compliance.
- Make regulations easier to access.
- Reduce compliance costs.
- Improve clarity and consistency for regulated entities.

RBI, vide its draft discussion paper dated 6th August 2026, has proposed amendments to the Credit Facilities Directions for Non-Banking Financial Companies, restricting NBFCs from extending revolving credit facilities and permitting only term loan products, subject to certain exemptions. As the proposal is currently at the draft/consultation stage and stakeholder comments have been invited, the final contours of the regulation, including its applicability and effective date, remain uncertain. The NBFCs who are presently extending revolving loan facilities as part of their lending business, have to closely monitor developments in this regard and, in the event the final regulation restricts or prohibits revolving credit facilities, will suitably realign their lending business model and product offerings to ensure full compliance with the RBI's regulatory framework.

NBFC Industry Outlook

NBFCs are strengthening their position by diversifying their funding sources. They are raising funds from both domestic and international markets while also partnering with banks to expand their lending capacity. Policy measures that improve access to funding and ease regulatory challenges can further strengthen the sector. Although banks continue to dominate the financial system, NBFCs remain attractive to investors because of their resilience and growth potential. With a strong capital base and evolving business strategies, the sector is well positioned to manage challenges, maintain a stable outlook for FY2026, and continue supporting financial inclusion.

- Equity Markets:

India is the Seventh-largest market by market capitalization. India's domestic equity markets continue to rank seventh globally with a market cap of over USD 4.9 trillion. Global equity market capitalization has expanded steadily over time, supported by economic development, improved corporate profitability, and broader investor participation.

Initial Public Offer:

In Financial Year 2026, a total of 366 Companies entered the IPO market, including 112 mainboard IPOs and a record 254 SME IPOs, raising a total of Rs. 1.9 trillion. Out of this, mainboard IPOs raised Rs. 1.8 trillion, while SME IPOs contributed the remaining amount. Nearly 90% of the IPOs were launched during the first nine months of financial year. Despite this, the total funds raised remained similar to Financial Year 2025. The average issue size for mainboard IPOs was Rs. 1,598 crore, showing a healthy capital-raising environment in the Indian market during the year.



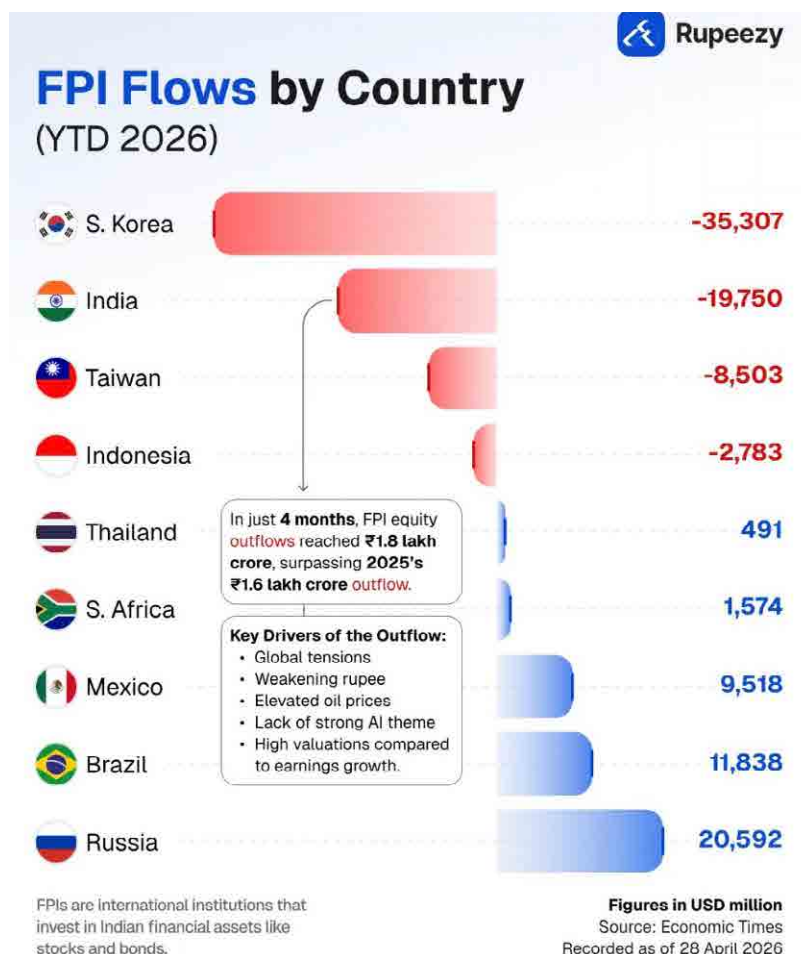

India's capital market has, over the past few years, transitioned from a liquidity-driven expansion to a structurally deeper financial ecosystem. This evolution is no longer defined solely by index performance or episodic inflows, but by sustained broadening of investor participation, increasing institutionalisation of savings, and a widening range of capital formation channels.

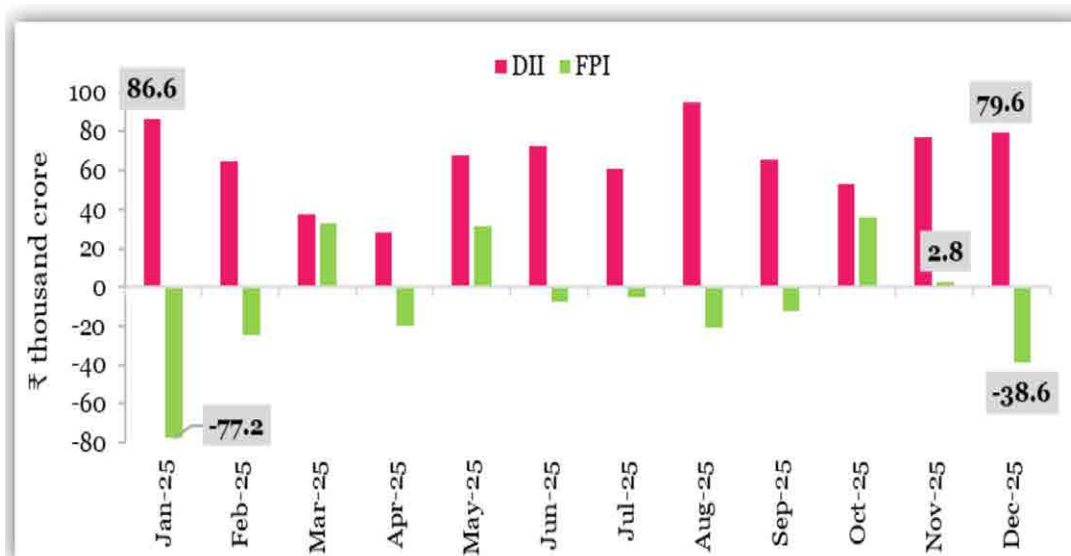
The Financial Year 2025-26 reflects this transition more clearly. Market activity remained elevated, but more importantly, the underlying drivers - household financialisation, domestic institutional flows, and greater penetration of financial products - continued to strengthen. At the aggregate level, India remained one of the largest equity markets globally by market capitalisation, supported by sustained economic growth, improving corporate balance sheets, and rising investor participation. Secondary market liquidity also remained robust despite periods of volatility, indicating that trading depth is now supported by structural domestic flows rather than temporary global liquidity cycles. This marks a clear shift from earlier periods, when market direction and liquidity were disproportionately influenced by foreign portfolio investors.

The Indian stock market closed FY 2025-26 with modest gains, demonstrating resilience despite significant foreign portfolio investor (FPI) outflows in the latter half of the year.

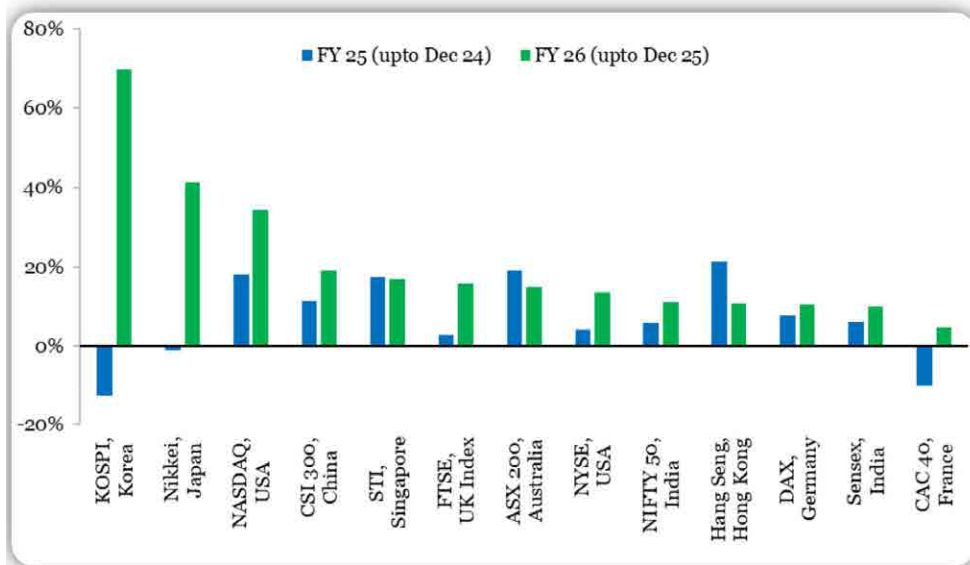
Trends in Foreign Portfolio Investment Flows by Country



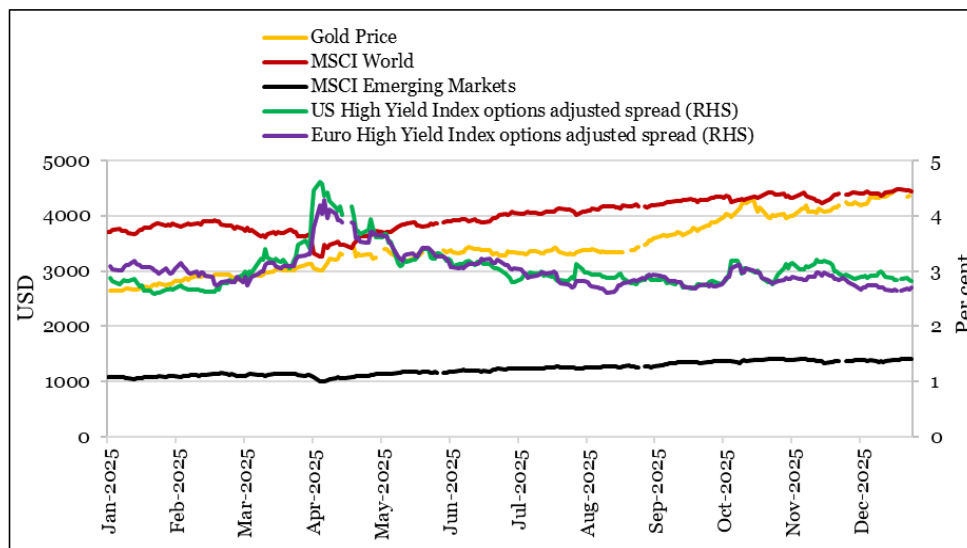
NET PURCHASES/SALES BY FPIS AND DIIS OF ASSETS:

The Indian economy offers strong growth opportunities driven by increased thrust on power and road infrastructure, and India's continued digitisation - particularly in Tier II to Tier IV markets - which presents significant growth potential. AI-led underwriting are leading to improved turnaround times, lower costs and enhanced risk assessment capabilities. Industry consolidation and scale benefits are creating stronger, well-capitalized players with improved governance and operational efficiencies. Financial inclusion continues to deepen, with NBFCs serving underpenetrated segments such as MSMEs, rural borrowers and informal income groups.

India being an emerging global economy, faces notable risks due to global relations. A shift in developed and emerging countries' interest rates, policies and protectionism along with trade and capital market conditions may hamper businesses locally. Geopolitical and trade tensions in the global market post further risk to the Indian NBFC industry. There is also investment/market risk arising from adverse movements in the market price of securities, which similarly depends on global market conditions and may impact the value of the investment portfolio. Enhanced RBI oversight and stricter compliance norms are increasing operational costs and constraining aggressive growth strategies. Increasing competition from banks, fintechs and well-capitalized NBFCs may also pressure margins and market share.

External risks include liquidity stress, political uncertainty and fiscal slippage concerns. Regulatory and compliance-related changes in the sector may also affect NBFCs. Any stringent regulatory change or unfavourable policy change can pose a threat to the industry players in the short run.

(e) **RISKS AND CONCERNS:**



The Financial services industry is subject to continuously evolving regulatory requirements due to increasing globalization, integration of world markets. Risk is an integral part of the business and almost every business decision requires the management to balance risk and reward. The Company is exposed to the market risk, liquidity risk, operational risk, compliance risk, cyber security risk, IT risk and credit risk. It is further exposed to risk of economic cycle. The Company manages these risks by remaining very conservative and following requisite risk management practices.

Steps taken by the Company to mitigate risk:

In addition to the risk mitigation measures set out above, the Company has adopted the following specific measures to manage and mitigate the risks associated with its investment portfolio, being an Investment and Credit Company (ICC) engaged primarily in the business of investment and trading in shares and securities:

- Equity Market Risk – Sector-wise Diversification:** The risk associated with equity market volatility has been managed by the Company through sector-wise segregation and diversification of its investment portfolio. The portfolio is diversified across various sectors, including Banking and Finance, Power, Pesticides, NBFCs, Insurance, Aluminium Products, among others, thereby reducing concentration risk and limiting the impact of adverse price movements in any single sector on the overall portfolio.
- Liquidity Risk Management:** A majority of the Company's investments are held in liquid and readily marketable securities, which provides financial flexibility and ensures the Company is well placed to meet its short-term obligations without being compelled to liquidate investments at unfavourable prices. In addition, the Company has availed loan facilities from various Non-Banking Financial Companies (NBFCs), which further supplements its liquidity position and provides an additional source of funding, thereby strengthening the Company's ability to manage timing mismatches between inflows and outflows.

- **Monitoring and Supervision:** The Company's investment portfolio is monitored on a regular basis and is actively managed by the Management, with periodic review of sectoral exposures, concentration levels and market developments. This continuous monitoring and supervision enables timely identification of emerging risks and facilitates prompt corrective action, including rebalancing of the portfolio, where considered necessary, to align with the Company's risk appetite and investment objectives.

Through the above measures, the Company continues to follow a conservative and disciplined approach to risk management, in line with its overall risk management framework and practices.

(f) INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY:

The Management has laid down a set of standards, processes and structure which enables it to implement internal financial controls across the organization with reference to financial statements and such controls are adequate and are operating effectively. Internal Finance control framework has been established in line with the Guidance Note on Audit of Internal Financial Controls over Financial Reporting issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (the 'Guidance Note').

As a part of the effort to evaluate the effectiveness of the internal control systems, your Company's internal audit system reviews all the control measures on a periodic basis and recommends improvements, wherever appropriate. The Company has in place adequate internal control systems and procedures commensurate with the size, scale, complexity and nature of its business. These systems and procedures provide reasonable assurance of adherence to the accounting procedures and policies, maintenance of proper accounting records, reliability of financial information, compliance with regulatory directives, efficacy of its operating systems, protection of resources and safeguarding of assets against unauthorized use. The management regularly reviews the internal control systems and procedures, undertake corrective actions, in their respective areas and thereby strengthen the controls.



The internal financial control is supplemented by extensive internal audits, regular reviews by the Management and standard policies and guidelines to ensure reliability of financial and all other records to prepare financial statements, its reporting and other data. The Audit Committee of the Board reviews internal audit reports given along with management responses. The Audit Committee also monitors the implemented suggestions. The Company has, in all material respects, adequate internal financial control over financial reporting and such controls are operating effectively.

The Statutory Auditors of the Company have also certified the existence and operating effectiveness of the internal financial controls relating to financial reporting as of March 31, 2026. During the year under review, no material or serious observation has been observed for inefficiency or inadequacy of such controls.

(g) SEGMENT-WISE OR PRODUCT-WISE PERFORMANCE:

The Company is engaged in the business of investment, trading in shares and securities, Lending Activities and generation of renewable energy. As per Ind AS 108 "Operating Segments", specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, there are no reportable operating or geographical segments applicable to the Company.

The gross revenue from Financing and Investment activities considered in profit & loss account (including unrealised gain) for the financial year 2025-2026 is Rs. 13,932.43 Lakhs and considered in other comprehensive income (including unrealised gain) is Rs. 3,524.52 Lakhs.

The gross revenue from generation of renewable energy for the financial year 2025-2026 is Rs. 22.21 lakhs. For detailed information, please refer to Note No. 40 of the Standalone and Consolidated Financial Statements of the Company for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026.

Note on Discontinuance of Windmill Power Generation Activity:

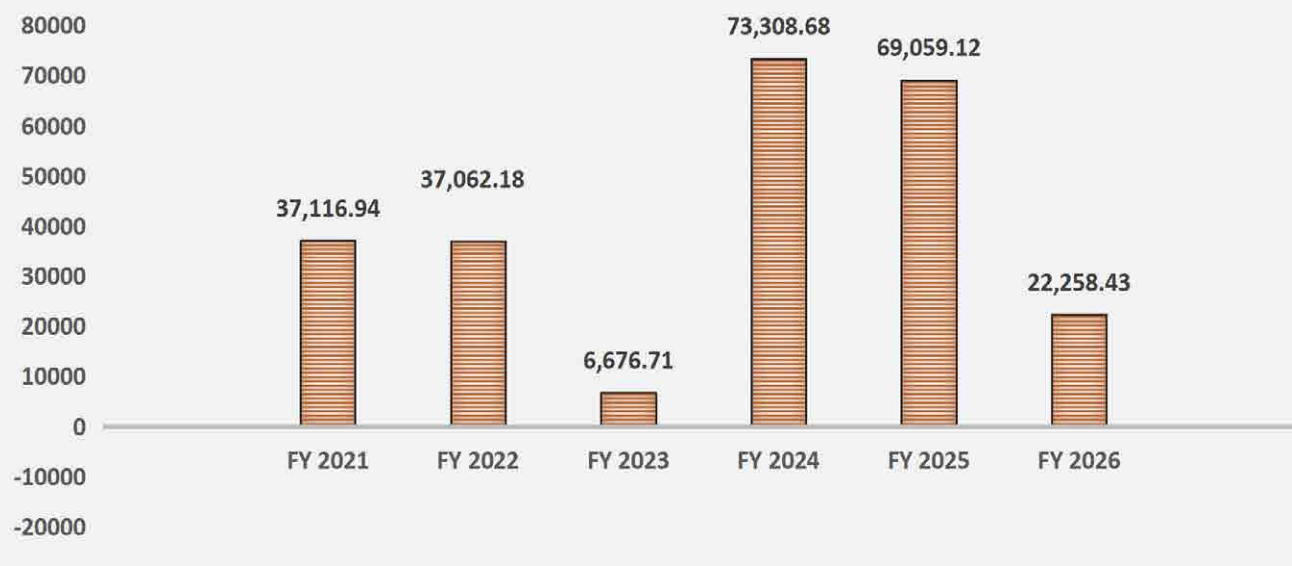
The Company had, in addition to its core business of investment and trading in shares and securities and lending activities, been engaged in the generation of electricity through a windmill as a renewable energy. During the year under review, the Company discontinued this windmill-based power generation activity, and the Board approved the disposal of the windmill. Accordingly, the windmill and the underlying land have been reclassified from Property, Plant and Equipment to Assets Held for Sale, in accordance with Ind AS 105, "Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations". This reclassification has been given effect to in the Standalone and Consolidated Financial Statements for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026.

The Company is mainly engaged in the business of investment and trading in shares and securities hence its profitability is directly linked to and impacted by equity market volatility. Ratios where there has been significant change (i.e. change of 25% or more as compared to the immediately previous financial year): All the figures mentioned hereunder are Rs. in Lakhs.

Interest Coverage Ratio:

On a standalone and consolidated basis, the Interest Coverage Ratio as on 31st March 2026 stood at 64.39, as against 44.94 as on 31st March 2025. The increase in the Interest Coverage Ratio is primarily attributable to a significant reduction in interest expenses during the year. Interest expenses stood at Rs. 255.77 lakhs as on 31st March 2026, as against Rs. 1,140.04 lakhs as on 31st March 2025.

Current Ratio:

On both a standalone and consolidated basis, the Current Ratio as on 31st March 2026 stood at 31.77, compared to 12.39 as on 31st March 2025. The significant increase in the Current Ratio is primarily due to a decrease in current liabilities during the year, with current liabilities declining to Rs. 849.25 lakhs from Rs. 2,547.47 lakhs as at 31st March 2025.

Debt Equity Ratio:

On a standalone and consolidated basis, the Debt-Equity Ratio as on 31st March 2026 stood at Nil, as compared to 0.01 as on 31st March 2025. The decrease in the Debt-Equity Ratio is primarily attributable to the repayment of borrowings, resulting in a debt-free capital structure as at 31st March 2026.

Net Profit Margin:

On a consolidated basis, net profit margin as on 31st March 2026 stood at 128.27%, compared to 89.37% as on 31st March 2025. The increase in the Net Profit Margin is primarily attributable to an increase in consolidated net profit, including the share of profit from associates and the realised gain (net of tax) recognised under the OCI category, during the year.

Return on Net Worth:

On a standalone basis, the Return on Net Worth as on 31st March 2026 stood at 8.26%, compared to 27.45% as on 31st March 2025. The decrease is primarily due to a reduction in Profit after Tax during the year, while the total equity base increased.

On a consolidated basis, the Return on Net Worth as on 31st March 2026 stood at 10.95%, compared to 25.56% as on 31st March 2025. The decrease is primarily attributable to the increase in the total equity base, while the Net Profit after Tax did not increase proportionately.

(j) HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT:

The Company's success is fundamentally driven by its human capital. Understanding that the motivated and skilled workforce is essential for long-term growth, the Company places a strong emphasis on creating a supportive environment that fosters both safety and productivity. The HR team plays a key role in nurturing a workplace founded on the principles of integrity, transparency and continuous learning, through its focus on equality and strict enforcement of zero tolerance towards harassment.

Being in the financial services sector, we recognize that our Company's growth is closely tied to the development of our employees. We are dedicated to fostering talent, recognizing each individual's unique strengths. The Human Resource Management Department (HRMD) undertook several initiatives during the financial year 2025-26 to strengthen human resources along with building a conducive working environment through new recruitments, skill enhancement through in-house and external training programmes and conducting regular meetings for employees, besides undertaking leadership development programme for senior management. Regular employee engagement initiatives and tailored development programmes ensure our team members reach their full potential. During the year 2025-26, there were 9 employees in the Company.

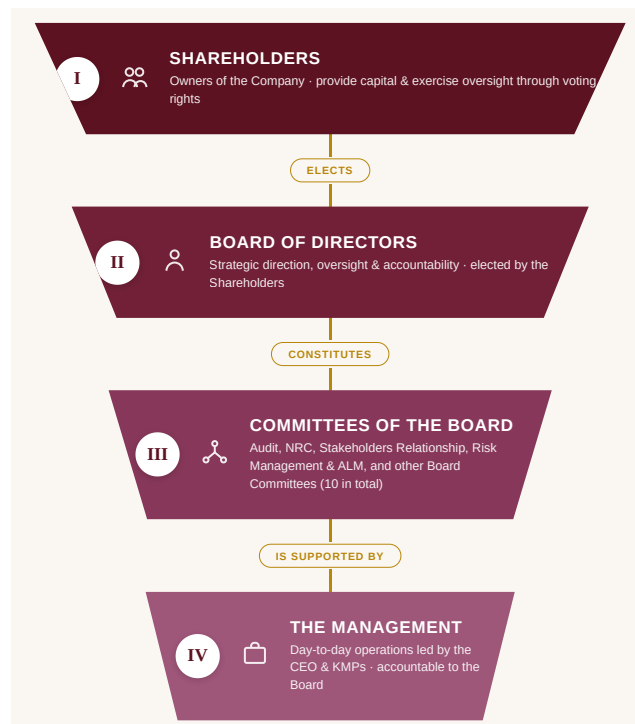
A. COMPANY'S PHILOSOPHY ON CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The Company has a well-informed, active, diverse and independent board, which upholds the highest standards of corporate governance.

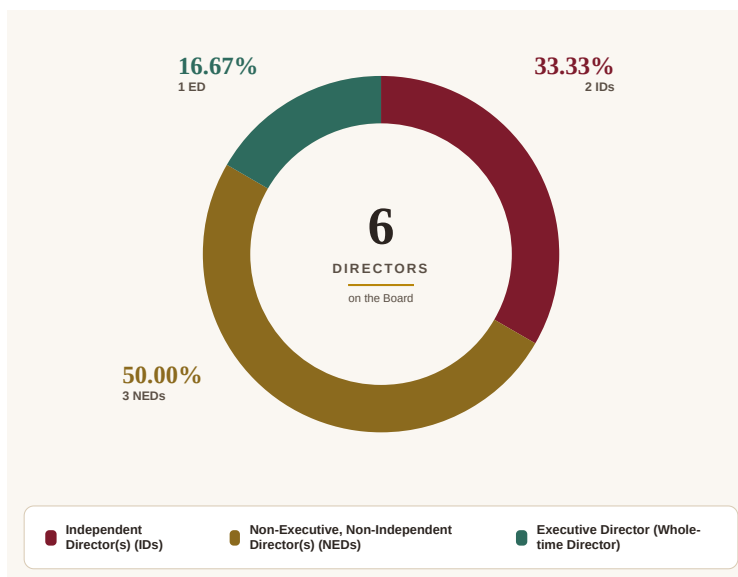

In line with the commitment to the principle of integrity and transparency in business operations for good corporate governance, the Company's policy is to have an appropriate blend of independent and non-independent directors to maintain the independence of the Board and to separate the Board functions of Governance and Management.

The responsibilities of the Board, inter alia, include formulation of overall strategy for the Company, reviewing major plan of actions, setting performance objectives, laying down the Code of Conduct for all members of the Board and the Senior Management team, formulating policies, conducting performance review, monitoring due compliance with applicable laws, reviewing and approving the financial results, enhancing corporate governance practices and ensuring the best interest of the community, environment and its various stakeholders.

The powers, role and terms of reference of the NRC cover the areas as contemplated under Regulation 19 read with Part D of Schedule II of the Listing Regulations and Section 178 of the Act, besides other terms as may be referred to by the Board of Directors.

The terms of reference of the NRC are as follows:

This includes:

1. Formulation of criteria for determining qualifications, positive attributes and independence of a director.
2. Recommending to the Board a policy relating to the remuneration for the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel and other employees.
3. Formulation of criteria for evaluation of Independent Directors and the Board.
4. Devising a policy on Board diversity and identification of persons who are qualified to become directors and who may be appointed in senior management in accordance with the criteria laid down and recommend to the Board their appointment and removal.
5. Recommend whether to extend or continue the term of appointment of the independent director, on the basis of the report of performance evaluation of independent directors.

Criteria for evaluation of the performance of Non-Executive Directors and Independent Directors:

One of the key functions of the Board is to monitor and review the Board's evaluation framework. The NRC lays down the evaluation criteria for the performance of the Board, the committees thereof, individual directors and the Chairman of the Board.

The terms of reference of the CSR Committee are in accordance with Section 135 (3) of the Act and are as under:

1. Formulate and recommend to the board a corporate social responsibility (CSR) policy.
2. Recommend the amount of expenditure to be incurred on the activities referred to above.
3. Monitor the CSR policy of the Company from time to time.
4. Oversee the Company's conduct regarding its corporate and societal obligations and its reputation as a responsible corporate citizen.

As per the provisions of Section 135 of the Act, the Company's CSR liability for Financial Year 2025-2026 was Rs. 5,54,40,189/-. However, in the previous year, the Company had spent an excess amount of Rs. 50,38,844/-. After setting off the said excess expenditure of the previous year, the net amount required to be spent during financial year 2025-2026 was Rs. 5,04,01,345/-.

Against this requirement, the Company spent Rs. 5,04,10,000/- towards CSR in financial year 2025-2026. Consequently, an excess of Rs. 8,655/- has been carried forward to the next year.

6. Review significant aggregate risk concentration and other escalations and approve significant corrective actions recommended by management.
7. Report to the full Board on the Company's most significant risk, risk trends, as well as related risk response strategies and the performance of the Company's risk management capabilities.
8. Frequent review of risk assessment.

9. To carry out such other functions as mentioned in the terms of reference of the RMC or prescribed under applicable statutory / regulatory requirements from time to time.
10. To Monitor and review the outcomes and keep the board of directors informed about the nature and content of its discussions, recommendations and actions to be taken.

VI. ASSET LIABILITY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE:

These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the standalone financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. For matter mentioned below, our description of how our audit addressed the matter is provided in that context.

We have determined the matters described below to be the key audit matters to be communicated in our report.

Fair Valuation of Financial Instruments The Company's investments, including investment in associates, are measured at fair value at each reporting date in accordance with Ind AS 113 – Fair Value Measurement and Ind AS 109 – Financial Instruments, and such fair value measurements significantly impact the results and net worth of the Company. While fair value of quoted instruments is determined by reference to prices in active markets, the unquoted portfolio (including investment in associates) is valued using methodologies that involve estimation and the selection of principal assumptions by Management. In particular, the Company carries an investment in equity shares of National Stock Exchange of India Limited ("NSE") at a fair value aggregating ₹ 202.65 Crore as at March 31, 2026; NSE's equity shares were not listed on any recognised stock exchange as at the reporting date, and in the absence of a quoted price in an active market, Management derives fair value from indicative prices available on dealer/broker platforms dealing in unlisted securities and, as a matter of prudence, applies a liquidity discount of 10%.	Our audit procedures in relation to the fair valuation of investments included, among others, the following: • We obtained an understanding and evaluated the design and implementation of Management's process and controls governing the identification, valuation and recording of investments, including unquoted equity instruments. • We verified the existence and ownership of the investments by inspecting the depository statement of holdings as at the reporting date and reconciling the quantity of shares held with the investment register and the books of account. • For quoted instruments, we independently obtained market quotations at the reporting date and re-computed the fair valuation, comparing our computation with the amounts recorded by Management.

Key Audit Matters	How our audit addressed the key audit matter
The measurement involves significant Management judgement over the reliability and corroboration of the pricing input, the classification of the measurement within the fair value hierarchy under Ind AS 113 having regard to the effect of the liquidity discount, and the determination of the quantum of such discount. Considering the materiality of the carrying amounts, the degree of estimation uncertainty and the extent of judgement involved, we determined the fair valuation of investments, and in particular the unquoted equity shares of NSE, to be a Key Audit Matter.	• For unquoted instruments, including investment in associates, we obtained an understanding of the valuation methods adopted, evaluated the appropriateness of the valuation approach and its consistency with the measurement and hierarchy principles of Ind AS 113, and analyzed the reasonableness of the principal assumptions and underlying data used. • In respect of the unquoted equity shares of NSE, we independently agreed the derived market value to prices available in the public domain on dealer/broker platforms dealing in unlisted securities as at the reporting date and assessed the reliability and corroboration of such prices. • We assessed the reasonableness of the 10% liquidity discount having regard to the illiquid nature of the instrument and the size of the holding and evaluated Management's rationale. • We re-performed the arithmetical accuracy of the fair value computation. • We evaluated the adequacy of the related disclosures, including the fair value hierarchy, valuation techniques, significant unobservable inputs and sensitivity thereto, in accordance with relevant Ind AS. Based on the audit procedures performed we are satisfied with existence and valuation of investments.

Other Information

The Company's management and board of directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Board's Report including Annexure to Board's Report, Management Discussion and Analysis, Corporate Governance Report in Annual Report of the Company for the financial year 2025-26 but does not include the standalone financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the standalone financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the standalone financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether such other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. When we read the Company's annual report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance and take necessary actions, as applicable under the relevant laws and regulations.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Standalone Financial Statements

The Company's management and board of directors are responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance, changes in equity and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting Standards specified under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rules 2015, as amended. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the standalone financial statements, the management and the board of directors is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Directors either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those Board of Directors are also responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the standalone financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these standalone financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the standalone financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION :

Winro Commercial (India) Limited referred to as ("The Company") is a Non-Banking Financial Company (NBFC) registered with the Reserve Bank of India under the category of Investment and Credit Company (NBFC – ICC) and has its registered office in Mumbai, Maharashtra, India.

The Company is engaged in the business of investment and trading in shares and securities and lending activities. The Company is also engaged in the business of generating power through windmill, a renewable source of energy. The shares of the Company are listed on the BSE.

The Company is classified as a Middle Layer (NBFC-ML) entity under the Scale Based Regulation (SBR) framework prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India, as its asset size exceeds Rs 1,000 crore. Accordingly, the Company complies with the applicable provisions of the Master Direction – Non-Banking Financial Company – Scale Based Regulation Directions, as amended.

The Standalone Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March, 2026 have been reviewed by the Audit Committee and approved by the Board of Directors at their meetings held on 27th May, 2026.

2. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS**MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES:****2.1 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE**

Standalone Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India including the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) prescribed under the Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended and relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

Accordingly, the Company has prepared these Standalone Financial Statements which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss for the year ended 31st March 2026, the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended 31st March 2026 and the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended as on that date, and accounting policies and other explanatory information (together hereinafter referred to as 'Standalone Financial Statements' or 'financial statements').

2.2 BASIS OF PREPARATION & PRESENTATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read together with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time, and other relevant provisions of the Act on an accrual basis. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Historical Cost Convention

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial assets and financial liabilities that are measured at fair value at initial and subsequent measurement as explained in the accounting policies below.

Historical cost is the consideration paid in exchange for the goods and services or the amount paid for acquiring the asset. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these financial statements is determined on such a basis.

The financial statements are presented in INR, which is also the Company's functional currency and all values are rounded off to the nearest lakhs (INR 00,000), except when otherwise indicated.

Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires Management to make use of estimates and judgements. In view of the inherent uncertainties and a level of subjectivity involved in measurement of items, it is

possible that the outcomes in the subsequent financial years could differ from those on which the management's estimates are based. Accounting estimates and judgements are used in various line items in the financial statements for e.g.:

- Business model assessment (refer Note No. 2.7)
- Fair value of financial instruments (Refer Note No 2.7)
- Impairment on financial assets (Refer Note No 2.7)
- Provision for tax expenses (Refer Note No 2.13)
- Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent assets (Refer Note No 2.15)

Presentation of financial statements

The Company presents its Balance Sheet in order of liquidity as provided by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) under Division III of Schedule III. An analysis regarding recovery or settlement within 12 months after the reporting date and more than 12 months after the reporting date is presented in Note No. 35 of the standalone financial statements.

The Company generally reports financial assets and financial liabilities on a gross basis in the Balance Sheet. They are offset and reported net only when Ind AS specifically permits the same or it has an unconditional legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts without being contingent on a future event. Similarly, the Company offsets incomes and expenses and reports the same on a net basis when permitted by Ind AS specifically unless they are material in nature.

2.3 PROPERTY, PLANT & EQUIPMENT (PPE) :

Recognition and initial measurement

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation/amortization and impairment losses, if any.

Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable / allocable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. The cost also includes direct cost and other related incidental expenses. Revenue earned, if any, during trial run of assets is adjusted against cost of the assets. Cost also includes the cost of replacing part of the plant and equipment.

Borrowing costs relating to acquisition / construction / development of tangible assets, if any, which takes substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are also included to the extent they relate to the period till such assets are ready to be put to use.

When significant components of property and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, recognition is made for such replacement of components as individual assets with specific useful life and depreciation, if these components are initially recognised as a separate asset. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognised in the statement of profit and loss as incurred.

Subsequent measurement (depreciation and useful lives)

Depreciation / amortization is recognised on a written-down basis as under:

Assets costing less than Rs. 5,000/- are fully depreciated in the year of purchase.

Depreciation method, useful life and residual value are reviewed periodically.

The carrying amount of PPE is reviewed periodically for impairment based on internal / external factors. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of assets exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's net selling price and value in use.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or cash generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

De-recognition

PPE are de-recognised either when they have been disposed of or when they are permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit is expected from their disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognised in the statement of profit and loss in the period of de-recognition.

2.4 BUSINESS COMBINATION :

Business Combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting, except for common control transactions which are accounted using the pooling of interest method that is accounted at carrying values.

The cost of an acquisition is measured at the fair value of the assets transferred, equity instruments issued and liabilities assumed at the acquisition date i.e., the date on which control is acquired. Contingent consideration to be transferred is recognised at fair value and included as part of cost of acquisition. Transaction related costs are expensed in the period in which the costs are incurred.

2.5 LEASE**Short-term leases:**

The company has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short term leases that have a lease term period of less than 12 months. The Company recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

2.6 INVESTMENTS IN ASSOCIATES :**Associates:**

An associate is an entity over which the Company has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

In accordance with Ind AS 27, Separate Financial Statements, the Company has elected to measure its investments in associates at fair value in accordance with Ind AS 109, Financial Instruments. Such investments are classified as Level 3 investments.

2.7 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS :**Recognition of Financial Instruments**

Financial instruments comprise of financial assets and financial liabilities. Financial assets and liabilities are recognised when the company becomes the party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

Financial assets primarily comprise of trade receivables, loan receivables, investments in shares & securities etc.

Financial liabilities primarily comprise of borrowings, trade payables and other financial liabilities etc.

Initial Measurement of Financial Instruments

Recognised financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs and revenues that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs and revenues directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

If the transaction price differs from fair value at initial recognition, the Company will account for such difference as follows:

- a. if fair value is evidenced by a quoted price in an active market for an identical asset or liability or based on a valuation technique that uses only data from observable markets, then the difference is recognised in profit or loss on initial recognition (i.e. day one profit or loss);
- b. in all other cases, the fair value will be adjusted to bring it in line with the transaction price (i.e. the recognition of profit or loss on day one will be deferred by including it in the initial carrying amount of the asset or liability).

After initial recognition, the deferred gain or loss will be released to the Statement of profit and loss on a rational basis, only to the extent that it arises from a change in a factor (including time) that market participants would take into account when pricing the asset or liability.

Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

All recognised financial assets that are within the scope of Ind AS 109 are required to be subsequently measured at amortised cost or fair value on the basis of the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

The Company recognises all the financial assets, other than measured at fair value or amortised cost, which are realised within 12 months, from the reporting date, at cost & not at fair value or amortised cost but tested for impairment.

Business model assessment

The Company determines its business model at the level that best reflects how it manages groups of financial assets to achieve its business objective. The Company's business model is assessed on an instrument by instrument basis.

- **Classification of Financial Assets**

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified into four categories:

- Debt instruments at amortised cost
- Debt instruments at Fair value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI)
- Debt and equity instruments at FVTPL
- Equity instruments designated at FVOCI
- **Debt instruments at amortised cost :**

The Company measures its financial assets at amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

- The asset is held within a business model of collecting contractual cash flows; and
- Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are Solely Payments of Principal and Interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

To make the SPPI assessment, the Company applies judgment and considers relevant factors such as the nature of portfolio and the period for which the interest rate is set.

The business model of the Company for assets subsequently measured at amortised cost category is to hold and collect contractual cash flows. However, considering the economic viability of carrying the delinquent portfolios in the books of the Company, it may sell these portfolios to other entities.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost on effective interest rate (EIR).

➤ **Debt instruments at FVOCI :**

The Company subsequently classifies its financial assets as FVOCI, only if both of the following criteria are met:

- The objective of the business model is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets; and
- Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are Solely Payments of Principal and Interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

Debt instruments included within the FVOCI category are measured at each reporting date at fair value with such changes being recognised in other comprehensive income (OCI) under the head “items reclassify to profit & loss”. The interest income on these assets is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified to profit or loss.

➤ **Debt / equity instruments at FVTPL:**

The Company classifies financial assets which are held for trading (stock-in-trade) & has elected to classify some other equity instruments under FVTPL category. These instruments are recorded and measured in the standalone balance sheet at fair value. Interest income is recognised in profit & loss as per the terms of contract. Dividends are recognised in profit & loss as dividend income when right to receive payment has been established. Gains and losses on changes in fair value of these debt and equity instruments are recognised on net basis through profit or loss.

The Company's majority of the investments into mutual funds, bonds, equity shares, alternative investment funds etc have been classified under this category.

➤ **Equity instruments designated at FVOCI:**

The Company's management has elected to classify irrevocably some of its equity investments as equity instruments at FVOCI, when such instruments meet the definition of Equity under Ind AS 32 'Financial Instruments. Such classification is determined on an instrument-by-instrument basis.

Gains and losses on equity instruments measured through FVOCI are never recycled to profit or loss, even on sale of investments. Dividends are recognised in profit & loss as dividend income when right to receive payment has been established.

De-recognition of Financial Assets

A financial asset is de-recognised only when:

- The Company has transferred the right to receive cash flows from the financial assets; or
- The right to receive cash flows from the asset have expired; or
- Retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial assets, but assumes contractual obligations to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients.

Where the entity has transferred an asset, the Company evaluates whether it has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In such cases, the financial asset is de-recognised. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not de-recognised.

On de-recognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received or receivable in profit & loss in case financial assets classified under FVTPL category.

In case of financial asset classified under FVOCI category, the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in other equity is transferred to retained earnings if such gain or loss would have otherwise been recognised in profit or loss on disposal of that financial asset.

Write-off

Loans and debt securities are written off when the Company has no reasonable expectations of recovering the financial asset (either in its entirety or a portion of it). This is the case when the Company determines that the borrower does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off. A write-off constitutes a de-recognition event. The Company may apply enforcement activities to financial assets written off. Recoveries resulting from the Company's enforcement activities will result in impairment gains.

Reclassifications

If the business model under which the Company holds financial assets changes, the financial assets affected are reclassified. The classification and measurement requirements related to the new category apply prospectively from the first day of the first reporting period following the change in business model that result in reclassifying the Company's financial assets. Such reclassification needs to be approved by the Board of Directors of the Company.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company recognises loss allowances using the expected credit loss (ECL) model for the financial assets which are not FVTPL. Expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to the 12-month ECL, unless there has been a significant increase in credit risk or the assets have become credit impaired from initial recognition in which case, those are measured at lifetime ECL. The amount of expected credit losses (or reversal) that is required to adjust the loss allowance at the reporting date is recognised as an impairment gain or loss in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Loss allowances for financial assets measured at amortised cost are deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets.

Measurement of expected credit loss

Expected credit losses are a probability weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows which the Company expects to receive).

Ind AS 109 requires all financial instruments other than those recognised as FVTPL and equity instruments to be classified into one of the three stages (Stage 1, Stage 2 or Stage 3) based on the assessed credit risk of the instrument/facility.

There are three stages:

- Stage 1 would include all facilities which have not undergone a significant increase in credit risk
- Stage 2 would include facilities meeting the criteria for Significant Increase in Credit Risk and facilities with Days Past Due (DPD) 30 or more. The Company may rebut this presumption based on behavioral pattern of financial instruments and
- The stage 3 will have facilities classified as NPA and facilities with DPD 90 or more.

Asset Classification and Provisioning

Loan asset classification and requisite provision made under RBI prudential norms are given below:

The Company continuously monitors all the financial assets subject to ECLs. In order to determine whether an instrument is subject to 12 month ECL (12m ECL) or life time ECL (LTECL), the Company assesses whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk or the asset has become credit impaired since initial recognition. The Company applies following quantitative and qualitative criteria to assess whether there is significant increase in credit risk or the asset has been credit impaired:

- (a) Historical trend of collection from counterparty;
- (b) Company's contractual rights with respect to recovery of dues from counterparty;
- (c) Credit rating of counterparty and any relevant information available in public domain;

After applying above criteria, the Management has decided to make minimum ECL provision as the provisioning rates (as given in above table) as per RBI prudential norms unless higher provisioning is required as per the above criteria.

Financial liabilities

A financial liability is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset or to exchange financial assets or financial liabilities with another entity under conditions that are potentially unfavorable to the Company or a contract that will or may be settled in its own equity instruments and is a non-derivative contract for which the Company is or may be obliged to deliver a variable number of its own equity instruments, or a derivative contract over own equity that will or may be settled other than by the exchange of a fixed amount of cash (or another financial asset) for a fixed number of its own equity instruments.

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

a. Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the EIR method. For trade and other payables maturing within operating cycle, the carrying amounts approximate the fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.

Interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the Effective Interest Method (EIR). Gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the liabilities are derecognised.

The Company recognises all the financial liabilities, other than those measured at fair value or amortised cost, which are settled within 12 months, from reporting date, at cost & not at fair value or amortised cost.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and the transaction cost. The EIR amortization is included as finance costs in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

b. De-recognition

A financial liability (or a part of a financial liability) is de-recognised from the Company's balance sheet when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the de-recognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Fair value measurement

The Company measures financial instruments at fair value on initial recognition and uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 - Level 1 hierarchy includes financial instruments measured using quoted prices in an active market. This includes listed equity instruments, traded debentures and mutual funds that have quoted price. The fair value of all equity instruments (including debentures) which are traded in the stock exchanges is valued using the closing price as at the reporting period. The mutual funds are valued using the closing NAV as published on Association of Mutual Funds of India (AMFI).

Level 2 - Level 2 hierarchy includes financial instruments that are not traded in an active market (for example, traded bonds/debentures, over the counter derivatives). The fair value in this hierarchy is determined using valuation techniques which maximise the use of observable market data. If all significant inputs required to measure fair value of an instrument are observable, the instrument is included in level 2. For unlisted shares, a **10% discount is applied as per company policy** when deriving the Level 2 output.

Level 3 - If one or more of the significant inputs is not based on observable market data, the instrument is included in level 3. Fair values are determined in whole or in part using a valuation model based on assumptions that are neither supported by prices from observable current market transactions in the same instrument nor are they based on available market data. Financial instruments such as unlisted equity shares, loans are included in this hierarchy.

For unlisted companies other than group companies, current market value can be verified from the public domain (e.g., websites of brokers in unlisted companies), has been classified under Level 2. As a prudent practice, the company has applied a 10% liquidity discount to the derived market value.

Investments in unlisted group companies are classified under Level 3, and their valuation is done on the basis of the latest available standalone/consolidated audited balance sheet, by applying the following formula:

"(Share capital + Other equity – Prepaid expenses) / Number of equity shares = Value per share"

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements at fair value on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation at the end of each reporting period and discloses the same.

Derivative financial instruments

The Company uses derivative financial instruments for trading purposes. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognised at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at fair value.

Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

Any gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of derivatives are taken directly to statement of profit and loss as "Gain / (Loss) from trading in securities (future and option segments)" under the head "Net gain / (loss) on fair value changes."

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet only if there is an enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts with an intention to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

2.8 REVENUE RECOGNITION

A. Interest Income

For all financial instruments measured at amortised cost, interest income is recognised using the effective interest rate (EIR), which is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument or a shorter period, where appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

B. Sale of product

Sale is recognised when the power is delivered by the Company at the delivery point in conformity with the parameters and technical limits and fulfilment of other conditions specified in the Wind Energy Purchase

Agreement. Sale of product is accounted for as per tariff specified in the Wind Energy Purchase Agreement. The sale of product is accounted for net of all local taxes and duties as may be leviable on sale of electricity for all electricity made available and sold to customers.

C. Dividend Income

Dividend income is recognised when the Company's right to receive payment is established.

D. Net gain on fair value changes

The Company recognises gains/losses on fair value changes of financial assets measured at FVTPL in the statement of profit & loss, which are further bifurcated between realised & unrealised gain / (loss). Net gain of fair value changes includes gain / (loss) on trading of shares & securities held as Stock-in-trade, gain / (loss) from shares trading in derivatives segment and realised / unrealised gain or (loss) on other financial instruments fair value through profit & loss account (FVTPL).

E. Other revenue from operations

Fees

A fee on financial guarantee is recognised based on term of engagement, if any.

F. Other Income

Other incomes are accounted on accrual basis.

2.9 EXPENDITURES

A. Finance costs

Borrowing costs on financial liabilities are recognised using the EIR.

B. Others

Other expenses are accounted on accrual basis.

2.10 FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

In preparing the financial statements of the Company, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rate of exchange prevailing on the date of the transactions.

At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

All exchange differences are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they arise.

2.11 CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand & bank balance in current account and deposit in fixed account with original maturities of three months or less, if any.

2.12 BORROWING COSTS

Borrowing costs that are attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets as defined in Ind AS 23 are capitalised as a part of costs of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use.

Interest expenses are calculated using the EIR and all other Borrowing costs are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they are incurred.

Interest expense on Amount borrowed specifically for Initial Public Offering (IPO) – Anchor and QIB Category are capitalised to investments.

2.13 INCOME TAXES**A) Current income tax**

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities using the tax rates and tax laws that are in force at the reporting date.

Current income tax relating to items recognised outside the statement of profit and loss is recognised outside the statement of profit and loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current income tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liability simultaneously.

B) Deferred tax

Deferred income tax is recognised using the balance sheet approach.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except:

- a) When the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.
- b) In respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in associates, when the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax assets to be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the relevant entity intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside the statement of profit and loss is recognised outside the statement of profit and loss. Such deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using substantively enacted tax rates expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which the temporary differences are expected to be received or settled.

Presentation of current and deferred tax:

Current and deferred tax are recognised as income or an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income, in which case, the current and deferred tax income/expense are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income.

The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

2.14 IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

An assessment is done at each Balance Sheet date to ascertain whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, an estimate of the recoverable amount of asset is determined. If the carrying value of relevant asset is higher than the recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down accordingly.

2.15 PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

The Company creates a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. The Company also discloses present obligations for which a reliable estimate cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Contingent Assets are not recognised in the financial statements.

2.16 STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS

Statement of Cash Flows is prepared segregating the cash flows into operating, investing and financing activities. Cash flow from operating activities is reported using indirect method adjusting the net profit for the effects of:

- i. changes during the period in inventories, operating receivables, payables and transactions of a non-cash nature;
- ii. non-cash items such as depreciation, provisions, deferred taxes, unrealised foreign currency gains and losses and;
- iii. all other items for which the cash effects are investing or financing cash flows. Cash and cash equivalents (including bank balances) shown in the Statement of Cash Flows exclude items which are not available for general use as on the date of Balance Sheet.

2.17 EARNINGS PER SHARE

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss (before Other Comprehensive Income) for the year attributable to equity shareholders (after deducting attributable taxes) by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss (before Other Comprehensive Income) for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

2.18 INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the Company, is classified as investment property. Investment property is measured initially at its cost, including related transaction costs and where applicable borrowing costs. Subsequent expenditure is capitalised to the asset's carrying amount only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are expensed when incurred. When part of an investment property is replaced, the carrying amount of the replaced part is de-recognised.

Investment properties are subsequently measured at cost less depreciation. Investment properties are depreciated using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives.

2.19 RETIREMENT BENEFITS**Short-Term Employee Benefits**

Liabilities for salaries and bonus, including non-monetary benefits, if any and accumulating leave balance in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period, are recognised as liabilities (and expenses) and are measured at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the related service.

Defined Contribution Plan and Defined Benefit Plan

Retirement benefits in the form of provident funds under the Employees Provident Fund (Misc. Provisions) Act, 1952 and gratuity under the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 are not applicable to the Company as the total number of employees is below the minimum required number of employees as specified in respective acts.

However, on the prudent basis, the company has made provision for gratuity.

The obligation is measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows using a discount rate based on the market yields of Indian government securities as at the balance sheet date for the estimated term of the obligations. Defined benefit costs comprising current service cost, past service cost and gains or losses on settlements are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as employee benefit expenses. Interest cost implicit in defined benefit employee cost is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss under employee benefit cost. Gains or losses on settlement of any defined benefit plan are recognised when the settlement occurs. Past service cost arising on account of any amendments is recognised as expense. Re-measurement gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognised in the period in which they occur, directly in other comprehensive income.

Other Long-Term Benefits

The expected costs of other long-term employee benefits such as accumulated leaves, are measured at present value of estimated future cash flows expected to be made by the Company and are recognised accordingly.

2.20 SHARE CAPITAL

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issuance of new ordinary shares and share options, and buyback of ordinary shares are recognised as a deduction from other equity.

2.21 SEGMENT REPORTING

According to Ind AS 108, identification of operating segments is based on Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) approach for making decisions about allocating resources to the segment and assessing its performance. The business activity of the company falls within one reportable business segment viz. "Investments, Trading in shares and securities & Lending Activities".

2.22 NON CURRENT ASSETS HELD FOR SALE

Non-current assets are classified as held for sale when their carrying amount is expected to be recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use. This condition is only met when the sale is highly probable and the asset, is available for immediate sale in its present condition and is marketed for sale at a price that is reasonable in relation to its current fair value. The Company must also be committed to the sale, which should be expected to qualify for recognition as a completed sale within one year from the date of classification.

Such assets are measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell, and depreciation or amortisation ceases from the date of such classification.

Nature and Purpose of Reserves:

a) Statutory reserve under Section 45-IC of The RBI Act, 1934

Every year the Company transfers a sum of not less than twenty per cent of net profit of that year as disclosed in the statement of profit and loss to its Statutory Reserve pursuant to Section 45-IC of the RBI Act, 1934.

The conditions and restrictions for distribution attached to statutory reserves as specified in Section 45-IC(1) in The Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934:

- Every non-banking financial company (NBFC) shall create a statutory reserve fund and transfer therein a sum not less than twenty per cent of its net profit every year as disclosed in the profit and loss account and before any dividend is declared.
- No appropriation of any sum from the statutory reserve fund shall be made by the NBFC except for the purpose as may be specified by the RBI from time to time and every such appropriation shall be reported to the RBI within twenty-one days from the date of such withdrawal: Provided that the RBI may, in any particular case and for sufficient

cause being shown, extend the period of twenty-one days by such further period as it thinks fit or condone any delay in making such report.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-section (1), the Central Government may, on the recommendation of the RBI and having regard to the adequacy of the paid-up capital and reserves of a NBFC in relation to its deposit liabilities, declare by order in writing that the provisions of sub-section (1) shall not be applicable to the NBFC for such period as may be specified in the order:

Provided that no such order shall be made unless the amount in the reserve fund under sub-section (1) together with the amount in the share premium account is not less than the paid-up capital of the NBFC.

b) General reserve

Amounts set aside from retained profits as a reserve to be utilised for permissible general purpose as per applicable Law.

c) Retained earnings

Retained earnings represents profits that the company earned till date including impact of changes in fair value of investments which are classified as FVTPL category, realised profit/(loss) on derecognition of equity shares classified as FVTOCI, less any transfers to General reserve, Statutory reserve, Dividends and other distributions paid to the shareholders.

d) Other comprehensive income

Other comprehensive income Reserve represents the cumulative changes in the fair value of certain investments in equity shares that the Company has elected to recognise in other comprehensive income. Such fair value changes are recognised and accumulated in the other comprehensive income – Equity Instruments through other comprehensive reserve. The Company transfers the amounts accumulated in this reserve, net of tax, to Retained Earnings upon derecognition of the relevant equity securities.

Remeasurements of defined benefit plans, comprising actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions, are also recognised in other comprehensive income in the period in which they arise.

Note 37 : Financial Instruments**- Financial Risk Management**

The Company has operations in India. Whilst risk is inherent in the Company's activities, it is managed through a risk management framework, including ongoing identification, measurement and monitoring subject to risk limits and other controls. The Company's activities are expose mainly to credit risk, liquidity risk and market risk.

This note explains the sources of risk which the Company is exposed to and how the entity manages the risk. The Company has exposure to the following risks arising from financial instruments:

- Credit risk
- Liquidity risk
- Market risk (including Interest rate risk & Price risk)
- Currency risk

In addition to the above, the Company also assesses and monitors enterprise risks, operational risks and information security risks as part of its overall risk management framework.

Risk management framework

Risk management forms an integral part of the business. The Company's board of directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. The board of directors are responsible for developing and monitoring the Company's risk management policies. The Company's Risk Management committee reports regularly to the board of directors on its activities.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities.

1. Credit Risk

Credit risk refers to the risk of default on its obligation by the counterparty resulting in a financial loss. Credit risk arises primarily from financial assets such as trade receivables, investments, other balances with banks, loans and other receivables.

The Company has adopted a policy of dealing with counterparties that have sufficiently high credit rating. The Company's exposure and credit ratings of its counterparties are continuously monitored. Credit risk arising from trade receivables are reviewed periodically and based on past experience and history. Management is confident of recovering all the dues. Credit risk arises from balances with banks is limited. The counterparties are bank with high credit ratings assigned by the credit rating agencies.

Trade receivables & other receivables

Exposures of trade receivables are reviewed at the end of each reporting period by the Company to determine expected credit losses. Historical trends of collection from counterparties on timely basis reflects low level of credit risk. However, company has policy to create impairment wherever required.

Investment in various instruments

Credit risk on investment in debt instruments is limited as company generally invests in debt instruments like mutual fund, preference shares, debentures with high credit ratings assigned by international and domestic credit rating agencies.

Loans

The Company considers default in all cases when the borrower becomes 90 days past due on its contractual payments. All performing standard assets loans are classified under Stage 1.

Expected Credit Loss (ECL) on Financial Assets

The Company continuously monitors all financial assets subject to ECLs. In order to determine whether an instrument is subject to 12 month ECL (12m ECL) or life time ECL (LTECL), the Company assesses whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk or the asset has become credit impaired since initial recognition. The Company applies following quantitative and qualitative criteria to assess whether there is significant increase in credit risk or the asset has been credit impaired :

- (a) Historical trend of collection from counterparty
- (b) Company's contractual rights with respect to recovery of dues from counterparty
- (c) Credit rating of counterparty and any relevant information available in public domain

ECL is a probability weighted estimate of credit losses. It is measured as the present value of cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with contract and the cash flows that the Company expects to receive). The Company has following types of financial assets that are subject to the expected credit loss:

- (a) Cash and cash equivalent
- (b) Bank balance other than (a) above
- (c) Loans
- (d) Trade receivables
- (e) Investment in unlisted securities
- (f) Other financial assets

After applying above criteria, Management has decided to make minimum ECL provision on Loans as the provisioning rates as per RBI prudential norms unless higher provisioning is required as per above criteria.

2. Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset.

The Company's principal sources of liquidity are cash and cash equivalents, investment in liquid mutual fund / other securities which are short term in nature and the cash flow that is generated from operations. In case of any shortfall, company has availed revolving loan facilities from its Group Companies and other NBFCs & also sale of listed equity shares.

As at 31st March, 2026, the Company had a cash and cash equivalents of Rs. **2,045.14 Lakhs**, listed equity shares of Rs. **97,940.15 Lakhs**, liquid mutual funds of Rs. **4,363.13 Lakhs** and as at 31st March, 2025, the Company had a cash and cash equivalents of Rs. 345.05 Lakhs, listed equity shares of Rs.1,15,808.26 Lakhs and liquid mutual funds of Rs. 20,186.98 Lakhs.

3 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices – such as interest rates, security prices and commodity prices– will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. Market risk is attributable to all market risk sensitive financial instruments including payables and debt. Company's market risk is primarily related to its investments in securities. Thus, Company's exposure to market risk is a function of investing activities and revenue generating and operating activities. The objective of market risk management is to mitigate market risk by diversification.

a Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk can be either fair value interest rate risk or cash flow interest rate risk. Fair value interest rate risk is the risk of changes in fair values of fixed interest bearing investments/liabilities because of fluctuations in the interest rates. Cash flow interest rate risks is the risk that the future cash flows of floating interest bearing investments will fluctuate because of the fluctuations in the interest rates. TO THE MEMBERS OF WINRO COMMERCIAL (INDIA) LIMITED

Report on the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of **WINRO COMMERCIAL (INDIA) LIMITED** ("the Company") and its associates companies, which comprise the consolidated Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026 and the consolidated statement of Profit and Loss (including other comprehensive income), consolidated statement of changes in Equity and consolidated statement of Cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information. (hereinafter referred to as "the consolidated financial statements")

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us and based on the consideration of reports of other auditors on separate consolidated financial statements of associates referred to in the "Other Matters" paragraph below, the aforesaid consolidated financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the consolidated state of affairs of the Company and its associates, as at March 31, 2026, of consolidated profit and loss including other comprehensive income, consolidated changes in equity and its consolidated cash flows for the year then ended.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Companies Act, 2013. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company and its associates, in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence obtained by us along with the consideration of reports of the other auditors referred to in paragraph (a) of the "Other Matters" section below, is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis of our audit opinion on the consolidated financial statements.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the Consolidated financial statements for the current financial year. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the consolidated financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. For each matter below, our description of how our audit addressed the matter is provided in that context.

Key Audit Matters	How our audit addressed the key audit matter
Fair Valuation of Financial Instruments	
The Company's investments (other than investment in associates) are measured at fair value at each reporting date in accordance with Ind AS 113 - Fair Value Measurement and Ind AS 109 - Financial Instruments, and such fair value measurements significantly impact the results and net worth of the Company. While fair value of quoted instruments is determined by reference to prices in active markets, the unquoted portfolio (other than investment in associates) is valued using methodologies that involve estimation and the selection of principal assumptions by Management.	Our audit procedures in relation to the fair valuation of investments included, among others, the following: • We obtained an understanding and evaluated the design and implementation of Management's process and controls governing the identification, valuation and recording of investments including unquoted equity instruments. • We verified the existence and ownership of the investments by inspecting the depository statement of holdings as at the reporting date and reconciling the quantity of shares held with the investment register and the books of account. • For quoted instruments, we independently obtained market quotations as at the reporting date and re-computed the fair valuation, comparing our computation with the amounts recorded by Management.

Key Audit Matters	How our audit addressed the key audit matter
In particular, the Company carries an investment in equity shares of National Stock Exchange of India Limited ("NSE") at a fair value aggregating ₹ 202.65 Crore as at 31 March 2026. NSE's equity shares were not listed on any recognised stock exchange as at the reporting date and, in the absence of a quoted price in an active market, Management derives fair value from indicative prices available on dealer/broker platforms dealing in unlisted securities and, as a matter of prudence, applies a liquidity discount of 10%. The measurement involves significant Management judgement over the reliability and corroboration of the pricing input, the classification of the measurement within the fair value hierarchy under Ind AS 113 having regard to the effect of the liquidity discount, and the determination of the quantum of such discount. Considering the materiality of the carrying amount, the degree of estimation uncertainty and the extent of judgement involved, we determined the fair valuation of investments (other than investment in associates), and in particular the unquoted equity shares of NSE to be a Key Audit Matter.	• For unquoted instruments, (Other than investment in associates), we obtained an understanding of the valuation methods adopted, evaluated the appropriateness of the valuation approach and its consistency with the measurement and hierarchy principles of Ind AS 113, and analysed the reasonableness of the principal assumptions and underlying data used. • In respect of the unquoted equity shares of NSE, we independently agreed the derived market value to prices available in the public domain on dealer/broker platforms dealing in unlisted securities as at the reporting date, and assessed the reliability and corroboration of such prices. • We assessed the reasonableness of the 10% liquidity discount having regard to the illiquid nature of the instrument and the size of the holding, and evaluated Management's rationale. • We re-performed the arithmetical accuracy of the fair value computation. • We evaluated the adequacy of the related disclosures, including the fair value hierarchy, valuation techniques, significant unobservable inputs and sensitivity thereto, in accordance with relevant Ind AS. Based on the audit procedures performed we are satisfied with existence and valuation of investments.
Consolidation procedure	
The Company holds investments in six entities which have been classified as associates and not as subsidiaries. The carrying value of these investments as at March 31, 2026 is ₹ 1,30,989.77 lakh. Two of these entities also hold shares in the Company resulting in a cross-holding. Under Ind AS 110, Consolidated Financial Statements, an investor controls an investee when it is exposed or has rights to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee; accordingly, an investor controls an investee only if it has power over the investee, exposure or rights to variable returns from its involvement with the investee, and the ability to use its power over the investee to affect the amount of the investor's returns. Where control exists, the investee is a subsidiary and is consolidated on a line-by-line basis. The assessment of control is not based on shareholding alone and involves judgement. Evaluating whether control or significant influence exists required us to consider the voting rights held, including potential voting rights arising from convertible instruments, options and warrants, representation on the Board of Directors, participation in policy-making processes, the Company's exposure or rights to variable returns from its involvement with the investee entities and its ability to direct the relevant activities of those entities, and whether the veto and reserved-matter rights available to the Company are substantive rights or only protective rights.	Our audit procedures included the following: • We obtained an understanding of the process followed by management for assessing whether the Company controls the investee entities. • We obtained an understanding of the procedure followed by management for consolidation. • We verified the shareholding and the proportion of voting rights held by the Company in each investee entity to the register of investments, demat holding statements and shareholding patterns confirmed by the investee entities. • We read the memorandum and articles of association of the investee entities to identify the rights available to the Company and to the other shareholders. • We evaluated whether the veto and reserved-matter rights available to the Company are substantive rights, which would give the Company power over the relevant activities of the investee, or protective rights, which relate only to fundamental changes or to exceptional circumstances and do not, of themselves, give rise to control. • We examined the terms of convertible instruments, options and warrants, if any, and assessed whether the resulting potential voting rights are currently exercisable and substantive for the purpose of the control assessment.

Key Audit Matters	How our audit addressed the key audit matter
Considering the significance of these investments to the consolidated financial statements and the judgement involved in the classification, we determined this to be a key audit matter.	• We evaluated the composition of the Board of Directors of each investee entity and the extent of the Company's representation thereon, and read the minutes of meetings of the Board and of general meetings to assess the pattern of decision-making and voting. • We assessed whether the Company participates in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee entities, including whether there are material transactions between the parties, interchange of managerial personnel or provision of essential technical information provision of essential technical information. • We assessed whether the Company is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee entities and whether it has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee entities. • We evaluated whether there was any change in facts and circumstances during the year, including changes in shareholding, Board composition or contractual arrangements, requiring reassessment of the conclusion reached in the earlier years. • We assessed management's conclusion that the Company does not control the six investee entities and that they are accordingly associates and not subsidiaries, with reference to the requirements of Ind AS 110 and Ind AS 28. Based on the audit procedures performed, we are satisfied with management's assessment that the Company does not control the six investee entities and that these entities are accordingly associates and not subsidiaries, with the procedure followed by management for the consolidation of associates.

Other Information

The Company's Management and Board of Directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to Board's report, corporate governance and Shareholder's Information, but does not include the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether such other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Consolidated Financial Statements

The Company's management and Board of Directors are responsible for the preparation and presentation of these consolidated financial statements in term of the requirements of the section 134 (5) of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) that give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position, consolidated financial performance and consolidated cash flows of the Company including its associates and jointly controlled entities in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Accounting Standards specified under section 133 of the Act. The respective Board of Directors of the companies included in the Company and of its associates are responsible for maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and its associates and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgements and estimates

that are reasonable and prudent; and the design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, which have been used for the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements by the Directors of the Company, as aforesaid.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, the respective Management and Board of Directors of the companies included in the Company and of its associates are responsible for assessing the ability of the Company and of its associates to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Directors either intends to liquidate the company and its associates or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. The respective Board of Directors of the companies and of its associates are responsible for overseeing the financial reporting process of the Company and of its associates.

Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial statements of its Associates to express an opinion on the consolidated financial statements. For the Associates included in the consolidated financial statements, which have been audited by other auditors, such other auditors remain responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audit carried out by them. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion. Our responsibilities in this regard are further described in the section titled "Other Matters" in this report.

Materiality is the magnitude of misstatements in the consolidated financial statements that, individually or in aggregate, makes it probable that the economic decision of a reasonably knowledgeable user of the consolidated financial statements may be influenced. We consider quantitative materiality and qualitative factors in

- i. planning the scope of our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work; and
- ii. to evaluate the effect of any identified misstatements in the consolidated financial statements.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements for the financial year of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Other Matters

The Consolidated Financial statements includes total of the Company's share of net profit/(loss) after tax of Rs. 9,285.79 Lakhs, other comprehensive income of Rs. 1,631.72 lakhs and total comprehensive income of Rs. 10917.51 lakhs for the year ended March 31, 2026, as considered in the Consolidated Financial Statements, in respect of its associates Singularity Holdings Limited, Better Time Realtors Private Limited, Arkaya Commercial Private Limited, Four Dimensions Securities (India) Limited, Urudavan Investment & Trading Private Limited and Saraswati Commercial (India) Limited whose financial statements have not been audited by us. These financial statements have been audited by other auditors whose reports have been furnished to us by the Management and our opinion on the Consolidated Financial Statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of these associates, and our report in term of subsection (3) of section 143 of the Act, in so far as it relates to the aforesaid associates is based solely on the reports of the other auditors.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements below, is not modified in respect of the above matters with respect to our reliance on the work done and the reports of the other auditors and the financial statements / financial information certified by the Management.

The previous year figures, for year ended March 31, 2025, included in the Consolidated Financial Statement have been audited by Sarda & Pareek LLP, Chartered Accountants.

- Pertain to the maintenance of records that, in reasonable detail, accurately and fairly reflect the transactions and dispositions of the assets of the company;

- Provide reasonable assurance that transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and that receipts and expenditures of the company are being made only in accordance with authorizations of management and directors of the company;
- Provide reasonable assurance regarding prevention or timely detection of unauthorized acquisition, use, or disposition of the company's assets that could have a material effect on the financial statements.

Inherent Limitations of Internal Financial Controls with reference to Consolidated Financial Statements

Because of the inherent limitations of internal financial controls over financial reporting, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projections of any evaluation of the internal financial controls over financial reporting to future periods are subject to the risk that the internal financial control over financial reporting may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026
1. CORPORATE INFORMATION :

Winro Commercial (India) Limited referred to as ("The Company") is a Non-Banking Financial Company (NBFC) registered with the Reserve Bank of India under the category of Investment and Credit Company (NBFC – ICC) and has its registered office in Mumbai, Maharashtra, India.

The Company is engaged in the business of investment and trading in shares and securities and lending activities. The Company is also engaged in the business of generating power through windmill, a renewable source of energy. The shares of the company are listed on the BSE.

The Company is classified as a Middle Layer (NBFC-ML) entity under the Scale Based Regulation (SBR) framework prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India, as its asset size exceeds Rs 1,000 crore. Accordingly, the Company complies with the applicable provisions of the Master Direction – Non-Banking Financial Company – Scale Based Regulation Directions, as amended.

The consolidated financial statements comprise of the financial statements of Winro Commercial (India) Limited (the 'Company') and its associates for the year ended on 31st March 2026 as per Indian Accounting Standard 28 'Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures.'

The Consolidated Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March, 2026 have been reviewed by the Audit Committee and approved by the Board of Directors at their meetings held on 27th May, 2026.

2. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS
MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES:
2.1 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

The Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India including the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) prescribed under the Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended and relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013. Accordingly, the Company has prepared these Consolidated Financial Statements which comprises of the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss for the year ended on 31st March 2026, the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended on 31st March 2026 and the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended as on that date, and accounting policies and other explanatory information (together hereinafter referred to as 'Consolidated Financial Statements' or 'financial statements').

2.2 BASIS OF PREPARATION AND PRESENTATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

These Consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read together with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time, and other relevant provisions of the Act on an accrual basis. The Consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Historical Cost Convention

The Consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial assets and financial liabilities that are measured at fair value at initial and subsequent measurement as explained in the accounting policies below.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

Historical cost is the consideration paid in exchange for the goods and services or the amount paid for acquiring the asset. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/ or disclosure purposes in these financial statements is determined on such a basis.

The financial statements are presented in INR, which is also the Company's functional currency and all values are rounded off to the nearest lakhs (INR 00,000), except when otherwise indicated.

Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of the Company's consolidated financial statements requires management to make use of estimates and judgements. In view of the inherent uncertainties and a level of subjectivity involved in measurement of items, it is possible that the outcomes in the subsequent financial years could differ from those on which the management's estimates are based. Accounting estimates and judgements are used in various line items in the financial statements for e.g.:

- Business model assessment (refer Note No. 2.8)
- Fair value of financial instruments (Refer Note No 2.8)
- Impairment on financial assets (Refer Note No 2.8)
- Provision for tax expenses (Refer Note No 2.14)
- Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent assets (Refer Note No 2.16)

Presentation of financial statements

The Company presents its Consolidated Balance Sheet in order of liquidity as provided by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) under Division III of Schedule III. An analysis regarding recovery or settlement within 12 months after the reporting date and more than 12 months after the reporting date is presented in Note No. 35 of consolidated balance sheet.

The Company generally reports financial assets and financial liabilities on a gross basis in the Consolidated Balance Sheet. They are offset and reported net only when Ind AS specifically permits the same or it has an unconditional legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts without being contingent on a future event. Similarly, the Company offsets incomes and expenses and reports the same on a net basis when permitted by Ind AS specifically unless they are material in nature.

2.3 PRINCIPLES OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and it includes the Company's share of profits, net assets and retained post acquisition reserves of the associates that are consolidated using the equity method of consolidation.

The accounting policies of the associate companies are consistent with those of the Company. If an associate uses accounting policies other than those of the Company for like transactions and events in similar circumstances, appropriate adjustments are made to the associate's financial statements when they are used by the Company in applying the equity method. If it is not practicable to do so, that fact is disclosed along with a brief description of the differences between the accounting policies

Associate Companies

Associates are those entities over which the Company has significant influence, but not control or joint control. Investments in associates are accounted for using the equity method and, are initially recognised at cost from the date significant influence commences, and thereafter, recognises the Company's share of post-acquisition profits or losses of the investee in the Statement of Profit and Loss, and the Company's share of Other Comprehensive Income of the investee in other comprehensive Income. Dividend received or receivable from associates are recognised as a reduction in the carrying amount of the investment. When the Company's share of losses exceeds the carrying value of investment in associates, the carrying value is reduced to nil and recognition of further losses is discontinued, except to the extent that the Company has incurred obligations in respect of the associates

2.4 USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of these consolidated financial statements in conformity with the recognition and measurement principles of Ind AS requires management of the Company to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosures including disclosures of contingent assets and contingent liabilities, as at the date of the consolidated financial statements and, the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised, and in the future periods which are affected.

2.5 PROPERTY, PLANT & EQUIPMENT (PPE) :
Recognition and initial measurement

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation/amortization and impairment losses, if any.

Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable / allocable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. The cost also includes direct cost and other related incidental expenses. Revenue earned, if any, during trial run of assets is adjusted against cost of the assets. Cost also includes the cost of replacing part of the plant and equipment.

Borrowing costs relating to acquisition / construction / development of tangible assets, if any, which takes substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are also included to the extent they relate to the period till such assets are ready to be put to use.

When significant components of property and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, recognition is made for such replacement of components as individual assets with specific useful life and depreciation, if these components are initially recognised as a separate asset. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognised in the statement of profit and loss as incurred.

Subsequent measurement (depreciation and useful lives)

Depreciation / amortization is recognised on a written-down basis as under:

Assets costing less than Rs. 5,000/- are fully depreciated in the year of purchase.

Depreciation method, useful life and residual value are reviewed periodically.

The carrying amount of PPE is reviewed periodically for impairment based on internal / external factors. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of assets exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's net selling price and value in use.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

De-recognition

PPE are de-recognised either when they have been disposed of or when they are permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit is expected from their disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognised in the statement of profit and loss in the period of de-recognition.

2.6 BUSINESS COMBINATION :

Business Combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting, except for common control transactions which are accounted using the pooling of interest method that is accounted at carrying values. The cost of an acquisition is measured at the fair value of the assets transferred, equity instruments issued and liabilities assumed at the acquisition date i.e., the date on which control is acquired. Contingent consideration to be transferred is recognised at fair value and included as part of cost of acquisition. Transaction related costs are expensed in the period in which the costs are incurred.

2.7 LEASE**Short Term Leases:**

The company has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short term leases that have a lease term period of less than 12 months. The company recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

2.8 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS :**Recognition of Financial Instruments**

Financial instruments comprise of financial assets and financial liabilities. Financial assets and liabilities are recognised when the company becomes the party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

Financial assets primarily comprise of trade receivables, loan receivables, investments in shares & securities etc.

Financial liabilities primarily comprise of borrowings, trade payables and other financial liabilities etc.

Initial Measurement of Financial Instruments

Recognised financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs and revenues that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs and revenues directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

If the transaction price differs from fair value at initial recognition, the Company will account for such difference as follows:

- a. if fair value is evidenced by a quoted price in an active market for an identical asset or liability or based on a valuation technique that uses only data from observable markets, then the difference is recognised in profit or loss on initial recognition (i.e. day one profit or loss);
- b. in all other cases, the fair value will be adjusted to bring it in line with the transaction price (i.e. the recognition of profit or loss on day one will be deferred by including it in the initial carrying amount of the asset or liability).

After initial recognition, the deferred gain or loss will be released to the statement of profit and loss on a rational basis, only to the extent that it arises from a change in a factor (including time) that market participants would take into account when pricing the asset or liability.

Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

All recognised financial assets that are within the scope of Ind AS 109 are required to be subsequently measured at amortised cost or fair value on the basis of the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

The Company recognises all the financial assets, other than measured at fair value or amortised cost, which are realised within 12 months, from the reporting date, at cost & not at fair value or amortised cost but tested for impairment.

Business model assessment

The Company determines its business model at the level that best reflects how it manages groups of financial assets to achieve its business objective. The Company's business model is assessed on an instrument by instrument basis.

- **Classification of Financial Assets**

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified into four categories:

- Debt instruments at amortised cost
- Debt instruments at Fair value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI)
- Debt and equity instruments at FVTPL
- Equity instruments designated at FVOCI
- **Debt instruments at amortised cost :**

The Company measures its financial assets at amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

- The asset is held within a business model of collecting contractual cash flows; and
- Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are Solely Payments of Principal and Interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

To make the SPPI assessment, the Company applies judgment and considers relevant factors such as the nature of portfolio and the period for which the interest rate is set.

The business model of the Company for assets subsequently measured at amortised cost category is to hold and collect contractual cash flows. However, considering the economic viability of carrying the delinquent portfolios in the books of the Company, it may sell these portfolios to other entities.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost on effective interest rate (EIR).

- **Debt instruments at FVOCI :**

The Company subsequently classifies its financial assets as FVOCI, only if both of the following criteria are met:

- The objective of the business model is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets; and
- Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are Solely Payments of Principal and Interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.
- Debt instruments included within the FVOCI category are measured at each reporting date at fair value with such changes being recognised in other comprehensive income (OCI) under the head "items reclassify to profit & loss". The interest income on these assets is recognised in profit or loss.
- On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified to profit or loss.

- **Debt / equity instruments at FVTPL:**

The Company classifies financial assets which are held for trading (Stock-in-trade) & has elected to classify some other equity instruments under FVTPL category. These instruments are recorded and measured in the consolidated balance sheet at fair value. Interest income is recognised in profit & loss as per the terms of contract. Dividends are recognised in profit & loss as dividend income when right to receive payment has been established. Gains and losses on changes in fair value of these debt and equity instruments are recognised on net basis through profit or loss.

The Company's majority of the investments into mutual funds, bonds, equity shares, alternative investment funds etc have been classified under this category.

➤ **Equity instruments designated at FVOCI:**

The Company's management has elected to classify irrevocably some of its equity investments as equity instruments at FVOCI, when such instruments meet the definition of Equity under Ind AS 32 'Financial Instruments'. Such classification is determined on an instrument-by-instrument basis.

Gains and losses on equity instruments measured through FVOCI are never recycled to profit or loss, even on sale of investments. Dividends are recognised in profit & loss as dividend income when right to receive payment has been established.

De-recognition of Financial Assets

A financial asset is de-recognised only when:

- The Company has transferred the right to receive cash flows from the financial assets; or
- The right to receive cash flows from the asset have expired; or
- Retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial assets, but assumes contractual obligations to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients.

Where the entity has transferred an asset, the Company evaluates whether it has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In such cases, the financial asset is de-recognised. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not de-recognised.

On de-recognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received or receivable in profit & loss in case financial assets classified under FVTPL category.

In case of financial asset classified under FVOCI category, the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in other equity is transferred to retained earnings if such gain or loss would have otherwise been recognised in profit or loss on disposal of that financial asset.

Write-off

Loans and debt securities are written off when the Company has no reasonable expectations of recovering the financial asset (either in its entirety or a portion of it). This is the case when the Company determines that the borrower does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off. A write-off constitutes a de-recognition event. The Company may apply enforcement activities to financial assets written off. Recoveries resulting from the Company's enforcement activities will result in impairment gains.

Reclassifications

If the business model under which the Company holds financial assets changes, the financial assets affected are reclassified. The classification and measurement requirements related to the new category apply prospectively from the first day of the first reporting period following the change in business model that result in reclassifying the Company's financial assets. Such reclassification needs to be approved by the Board of Directors of the company.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company recognises loss allowances using the expected credit loss (ECL) model for the financial assets which are not FVTPL. Expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to the 12-month ECL, unless there has been a significant increase in credit risk or the assets have become credit impaired from initial recognition in which case, those are measured at lifetime ECL. The amount of expected credit losses (or reversal) that is required to adjust the loss allowance at the reporting date is recognised as an impairment gain or loss in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Loss allowances for financial assets measured at amortised cost are deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets.

Measurement of expected credit loss

Expected credit losses are a probability weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows which the Company expects to receive).

IND AS 109 requires all financial instruments other than those recognised as FVTPL and equity instruments to be classified into one of the three stages (Stage 1, Stage 2 or Stage 3) based on the assessed credit risk of the instrument/facility.

There are three stages:

- Stage 1 would include all facilities which have not undergone a significant increase credit risk.
- Stage 2 would include facilities meeting the criteria for Significant Increase in Credit Risk and facilities with Days Past Due (DPD) 30 or more. The Company may rebut this presumption based on behavioral pattern of financial instruments and
- The stage 3 will have facilities classified as NPA and facilities with DPD 90 or more.

Asset Classification and Provisioning

Loan asset classification and requisite provision made under RBI prudential norms are given below:

The Company continuously monitors all the financial assets subject to ECLs. In order to determine whether an instrument is subject to 12 month ECL (12m ECL) or life time ECL (LTECL), the Company assesses whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk or the asset has become credit impaired since initial recognition. The Company applies following quantitative and qualitative criteria to assess whether there is significant increase in credit risk or the asset has been credit impaired:

- Historical trend of collection from counterparty;
- Company's contractual rights with respect to recovery of dues from counterparty;
- Credit rating of counterparty and any relevant information available in public domain;

After applying above criteria, the Management has decided to make minimum ECL provision as the provisioning rates (as given in above table) as per RBI prudential norms unless higher provisioning is required as per the above criteria.

Financial liabilities

A financial liability is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset or to exchange financial assets or financial liabilities with another entity under conditions that are potentially unfavorable to the Company or a contract that will or may be settled in its own equity instruments and is a non-derivative contract for which the Company is or may be obliged to deliver a variable number of its own equity instruments, or a derivative contract over own equity that will or may be settled other than by the exchange of a fixed amount of cash (or another financial asset) for a fixed number of its own equity instruments. All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

a. Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the EIR method. For trade and other payables maturing within operating cycle, the carrying amounts approximate the fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

Interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the Effective Interest Method (EIR). Gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the liabilities are derecognised.

The Company recognises all the financial liabilities, other than those measured at fair value or amortised cost, which are settled within 12 months, from reporting date, at cost & not at fair value or amortised cost.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and the transaction cost. The EIR amortization is included as finance costs in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

b. De-recognition

A financial liability (or a part of a financial liability) is de-recognised from the Company's consolidated balance sheet when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the de-recognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid is recognised in the consolidated statement of Profit and Loss.

Fair value measurement

The Company measures financial instruments at fair value on initial recognition and uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs. All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 - Level 1 hierarchy includes financial instruments measured using quoted prices in an active market. This includes listed equity instruments, traded debentures and mutual funds that have quoted price. The fair value of all equity instruments (including debentures) which are traded in the stock exchanges is valued using the closing price as at the reporting period. The mutual funds are valued using the closing NAV as published on Association of Mutual Funds of India (AMFI).

Level 2 - Level 2 hierarchy includes financial instruments that are not traded in an active market (for example, traded bonds/debentures, over the counter derivatives). The fair value in this hierarchy is determined using valuation techniques which maximise the use of observable market data. If all significant inputs required to measure fair value of an instrument are observable, the instrument is included in level 2. For unlisted shares, a 10% discount is applied as per company policy when deriving the Level 2 output.

Level 3 - If one or more of the significant inputs is not based on observable market data, the instrument is included in level 3. Fair values are determined in whole or in part using a valuation model based on assumptions that are neither supported by prices from observable current market transactions in the same instrument nor are they based on available market data. Financial instruments such as unlisted equity shares, loans are included in this hierarchy.

For unlisted companies other than group companies, current market value can be verified from the public domain (e.g., websites of brokers in unlisted companies), has been classified under Level 2. As a prudent practice, the company has applied a 10% liquidity discount to the derived market value.

Investments in unlisted group companies are classified under Level 3, and their valuation is done on the basis of the latest available standalone/consolidated audited balance sheet, by applying the following formula:

"(Share capital + Other equity – Prepaid expenses) / Number of equity shares = Value per share"

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements at fair value on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation at the end of each reporting period and discloses the same.

Derivative financial instruments

The Company uses derivative financial instruments for trading purposes. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognised at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at fair value.

Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

Any gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of derivatives are taken directly to statement of profit and loss as "Gain / (Loss) from trading in securities (future and option segments)" under the head "Net gain / (loss) on fair value changes."

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the consolidated balance sheet only if there is an enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts with an intention to settle on a net basis or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

2.9 REVENUE RECOGNITION**A. Interest Income**

For all financial instruments measured at amortised cost, interest income is recognised using the effective interest rate (EIR), which is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument or a shorter period, where appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

B. Sale of products

Sale is recognised when the power is delivered by the Company at the delivery point in conformity with the parameters and technical limits and fulfilment of other conditions specified in the Wind Energy Purchase Agreement. Sale of product is accounted for as per tariff specified in the Wind Energy Purchase Agreement. The sale of product is accounted for net of all local taxes and duties as may be leviable on sale of electricity for all electricity made available and sold to customers

C. Dividend Income

Dividend income is recognised when the Company's right to receive payment is established.

D. Net gain on fair value changes

The Company recognises gains/losses on fair value changes of financial assets measured at FVTPL in the statement of profit & loss, which are further bifurcated between realised & unrealised gain / (loss). Net gain of fair value changes includes gain / (loss) on trading of shares & securities held as Stock-in-trade, gain / (loss) from shares trading in derivatives segment and realised / unrealised gain or (loss) on other financial instruments fair value through profit & loss account (FVTPL).

E. Other revenue from operations**Fees**

A fee on financial guarantee is recognised based on term of engagement, if any.

F. Other Income

Other incomes are accounted on accrual basis.

2.10 EXPENDITURES**A. Finance costs**

Borrowing costs on financial liabilities are recognised using the EIR.

B. Others

Other expenses are accounted on accrual basis.

2.11 FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

In preparing the financial statements of the Company, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rate of exchange prevailing on the date of the transactions.

At the end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

All exchange differences are recognised in the Statement Profit and Loss in the period in which they arise.

2.12 CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand & bank balance in current account and deposit in fixed account with original maturities of three months or less.

2.13 BORROWING COSTS

Borrowing costs that are attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets as defined in Ind AS 23 are capitalised as a part of costs of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use.

Interest expenses are calculated using the EIR and all other Borrowing costs are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they are incurred.

Interest expense on Amount borrowed specifically for Initial Public Offering (IPO) – Anchor and QIB Category are capitalised to investments.

2.14 INCOME TAXES**A) Current income tax**

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities using the tax rates and tax laws that are in force at the reporting date.

Current income tax relating to items recognised outside the statement of profit and loss is recognised outside the statement of profit and loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current income tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liability simultaneously.

B) Deferred tax

Deferred income tax is recognised using the balance sheet approach.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except:

- a) When the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.
- b) In respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in associates, when the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised.

Deferred taxes are not provided on the undistributed earnings of associates where it is expected that the earnings of the associates will not be distributed in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the relevant entity intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside the statement of profit and loss is recognised outside the statement of profit and loss. Such deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using substantively enacted tax rates expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which the temporary differences are expected to be received or settled.

Presentation of current and deferred tax:

Current and deferred tax are recognised as income or an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income, in which case, the current and deferred tax income/expense are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income.

The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

2.15 IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

An assessment is done at each consolidated balance sheet date to ascertain whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, an estimate of the recoverable amount of asset is determined. If the carrying value of relevant asset is higher than the recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down accordingly.

2.16 PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

The Company creates a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. The Company also discloses present obligations for which a reliable estimate cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Contingent Assets are not recognised in the consolidated financial statements.

2.17 STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS

Statement of Cash Flows is prepared segregating the cash flows into operating, investing and financing activities. Cash flow from operating activities is reported using indirect method adjusting the net profit for the effects of:

- i. changes during the period in inventories, operating receivables, payables and transactions of a non-cash nature;
- ii. non-cash items such as depreciation, provisions, deferred taxes, unrealised foreign currency gains and losses and;
- iii. all other items for which the cash effects are investing or financing cash flows. Cash and cash equivalents (including bank balances) shown in the Statement of Cash Flows exclude items which are not available for general use as on the date of consolidated balance sheet.

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss (before Other Comprehensive Income) for the year attributable to equity shareholders (after deducting attributable taxes) by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss (before Other Comprehensive Income) for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

2.19 INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Property that is held for long-term rental yields or for capital appreciation or both, and that is not occupied by the Company, is classified as investment property. Investment property is measured initially at its cost, including related transaction costs and where applicable borrowing costs. Subsequent expenditure is capitalised to the asset's carrying amount only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are expensed when incurred. When part of an investment property is replaced, the carrying amount of the replaced part is de-recognised.

Investment properties are subsequently measured at cost less depreciation. Investment properties are depreciated using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives.

2.20 RETIREMENT BENEFITS**Short-Term Employee Benefits**

Liabilities for salaries and bonus, including non-monetary benefits, if any and accumulating leave balance in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period, are recognised as liabilities (and expenses) and are measured at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the related service.

Defined Contribution Plan and Defined Benefit Plan

Retirement benefits in the form of provident fund under the Employees Provident Fund (Misc. Provisions) Act, 1952 and gratuity under the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 are not applicable to the Company as the total number of employees is below the minimum required number of employees as specified in respective acts.

However on the prudent basis the company has made provision for gratuity.

The obligation is measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows using a discount rate based on the market yields of Indian government securities as at the balance sheet date for the estimated term of the obligations. Defined benefit costs comprising current service cost, past service cost and gains or losses on settlements are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as employee benefit expenses. Interest cost implicit in defined benefit employee cost is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss under employee benefit cost. Gains or losses on settlement of any defined benefit plan are recognised when the settlement occurs. Past service cost arising on account of any amendments is recognised as expense. Re-measurement gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognised in the period in which they occur, directly in other comprehensive income.

Other Long-Term Benefits

The expected costs of other long-term employee benefits such as accumulated leaves, are measured at present value of estimated future cash flows expected to be made by the Company and are recognised accordingly.

2.21 SHARE CAPITAL

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issuance of new ordinary shares and share options, and buyback of ordinary shares are recognised as a deduction from other equity.

2.22 SEGMENT REPORTING

According to Ind AS 108, identification of operating segments is based on Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) approach for making decisions about allocating resources to the segment and assessing its performance. The business activity of the company falls within one reportable business segment viz. "Investments, Trading in shares and securities & Lending Activities".

2.23 NON CURRENT ASSETS HELD FOR SALE

Non-current assets are classified as held for sale when their carrying amount is expected to be recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use. This condition is only met when the sale is highly probable and the asset, is available for immediate sale in its present condition and is marketed for sale at a price that is reasonable in relation to its current fair value. The Company must also be committed to the sale, which should be expected to qualify for recognition as a completed sale within one year from the date of classification.

Such assets are measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell, and depreciation or amortisation ceases from the date of such classification.

2.24 COMMITMENTS

Commitments are future liabilities for contractual payments, classified and disclosed as follows:

- i. estimated amount of contracts remaining to be executed on capital account and not provided for;
- ii. uncalled liability on shares and other investments partly paid;

The cumulative excess so appropriated amounted to Rs 2,270.58 lakh as at 1st April 2024 and Rs 3,506.60 lakh as at 31st March 2025. Nature and Purpose of Reserves:**a) Statutory reserve under Sec 45-IC of The RBI Act, 1934**

Every year the Company transfers a of sum of not less than twenty per cent of net profit of that year as disclosed in the statement of profit and loss to its Statutory Reserve pursuant to Section 45-IC of the RBI Act, 1934.

The conditions and restrictions for distribution attached to statutory reserves as specified in Section 45-IC (1) in The Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934:

1. Every non-banking financial company (NBFC) shall create a statutory reserve fund and transfer therein a sum not less than twenty per cent of its net profit every year as disclosed in the profit and loss account and before any dividend is declared.
2. No appropriation of any sum from the statutory reserve fund shall be made by the NBFC except for the purpose as may be specified by the RBI from time to time and every such appropriation shall be reported to the RBI within twenty-one days from the date of such withdrawal: Provided that the RBI may, in any particular case and for sufficient cause being shown, extend the period of twenty-one days by such further period as it thinks fit or condone any delay in making such report.
3. Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-section (1), the Central Government may, on the recommendation of the RBI and having regard to the adequacy of the paid-up capital and reserves of a NBFC in relation to its deposit liabilities, declare by order in writing that the provisions of sub-section (1) shall not be applicable to the NBFC for such period as may be specified in the order:

Provided that no such order shall be made unless the amount in the reserve fund under sub-section (1) together with the amount in the share premium account is not less than the paid-up capital of the NBFC.

b) General reserve

Amounts set aside from retained profits as a reserve to be utilised for permissible general purpose as per applicable Law.

c) Retained earnings

Retained earnings represents profits that the company earned till date including impact of changes in fair value of investments which are classified as FVTPL category, realised profit/(loss) on derecognition of equity shares classified as FVTOCI, less any transfers to General reserve, Statutory reserve, Dividends and other distributions paid to the shareholders.

d) Capital reserve (Bargain Purchase Gain)

Capital reserve on consolidation represents gain on acquisition of stake in Associates.

e) Equity component of compound financial instruments

This reserve represents company's share in Equity component of compound financial instruments of associates.

f) Financial guarantee - Capital Contribution

This reserve represents company's share in Financial Guarantee - Capital Contribution of associates.

(g) Other comprehensive income

Other comprehensive income Reserve represents the cumulative changes in the fair value of certain investments in equity shares that the Company has elected to recognise in other comprehensive income. Such fair value changes are recognised and accumulated in the other comprehensive income – Equity Instruments through other comprehensive reserve. The Company transfers the amounts accumulated in this reserve, net of tax, to Retained Earnings upon derecognition of the relevant equity securities.

Remeasurements of defined benefit plans, comprising actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions, are also recognised in other comprehensive income in the period in which they arise.

Note 37 : Financial Instruments**- Financial Risk Management**

The Company has operations in India. Whilst risk is inherent in the Company's activities, it is managed through a risk management framework, including ongoing identification, measurement, and monitoring, subject to risk limits and other controls. The Company's activities are exposed mainly to credit risk, liquidity risk, and market risk.

This note explains the sources of risk to which the Company is exposed and how the entity manages that risk. The Company has exposure to the following risks arising from financial instruments:

- Credit risk
- Liquidity risk
- Market risk (including Interest rate risk & Price risk)
- Currency risk

In addition to the above, the Company also assesses and monitors enterprise risks, operational risks and information security risks as part of its overall risk management framework.

Risk management framework

Risk management forms an integral part of the business. The Company's board of directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. The board of directors are responsible for developing and monitoring the Company's risk management policies. The Company's Risk Management committee reports regularly to the board of directors on its activities.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities.

1. Credit Risk

Credit risk refers to the risk of default on its obligation by the counterparty resulting in a financial loss. Credit risk arises primarily from financial assets such as trade receivables, investments, other balances with banks, loans and other receivables.

The Company has adopted a policy of dealing with counterparties that have sufficiently high credit rating. The Company's exposure and credit ratings of its counterparties are continuously monitored. Credit risk arising from trade receivables are reviewed periodically and based on past experience and history. Management is confident of recovering all the dues. Credit risk arises from balances with banks is limited. The counter parties are bank with high credit ratings assigned by the credit rating agencies.

Trade receivables & other receivables

Exposures of trade receivables are reviewed at the end of each reporting period by the Company to determine expected credit losses. Historical trends of collection from counterparties on timely basis reflects low level of credit risk. However, company has policy to create impairment wherever required.

Investment in various instruments

Credit risk on investment in debt instruments is limited as company generally invests in debt instruments like mutual fund, preference shares, debentures with high credit ratings assigned by international and domestic credit rating agencies.

Loans

The Company considers default in all cases when the borrower becomes 90 days past due on its contractual payments. All performing standard assets loans are classified under Stage 1.

Expected Credit Loss (ECL) on Financial Assets

The Company continuously monitors all financial assets subject to ECLs. In order to determine whether an instrument is subject to 12 month ECL (12m ECL) or life time ECL (LTECL), the Company assesses whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk or the asset has become credit impaired since initial recognition. The Company applies following quantitative and qualitative criteria to assess whether there is significant increase in credit risk or the asset has been credit impaired :

- (a) Historical trend of collection from counterparty
- (b) Company's contractual rights with respect to recovery of dues from counterparty
- (c) Credit rating of counterparty and any relevant information available in public domain

ECL is a probability weighted estimate of credit losses. It is measured as the present value of cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with contract and the cash flows that the Company expects to receive). The Company has following types of financial assets that are subject to the expected credit loss:

- (a) Cash and cash equivalent
- (b) Bank balance other than (a) above
- (c) Loans

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- (d) Trade receivables
- (e) Investment in unlisted securities
- (f) Other financial assets

After applying above criteria, Management has decided to make minimum ECL provision on Loans as the provisioning rates as per RBI prudential norms unless higher provisioning is required as per above criteria.

2. Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset.

The Company's principal sources of liquidity are cash and cash equivalents, investment in liquid mutual fund / other securities which are short term in nature and the cash flow that is generated from operations. In case of any shortfall, company has availed revolving loan facilities from its Group Companies and other NBFCs & also sale of listed equity shares.

As at 31st March, 2026, the Company had a cash and cash equivalents of Rs. **2,045.14 Lakhs**, listed equity shares of Rs. **1,09,053.68 Lakhs**, liquid mutual funds of Rs. **4,363.13 Lakhs** and as at 31st March, 2025, the Company had a cash and cash equivalents of Rs. 345.05 Lakhs, listed equity shares of Rs. 1,16,025.17 Lakhs and liquid mutual funds of Rs. 20,186.98 Lakhs.

3 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices – such as interest rates, security prices and commodity prices– will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. Market risk is attributable to all market risk sensitive financial instruments including payables and debt. Company's market risk is primarily related to its investments in securities. Thus, Company's exposure to market risk is a function of investing activities and revenue generating and operating activities. The objective of market risk management is to mitigate market risk by diversification.

a Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk can be either fair value interest rate risk or cash flow interest rate risk. Fair value interest rate risk is the risk of changes in fair values of fixed interest bearing investments/liabilities because of fluctuations in the in the interest rates. Cash flow interest rate risks is the risk that the future cash flows of floating interest bearing investments will fluctuate because of the fluctuations in the interest rates.
